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# **Staff Reports**

## Report of the Rector

THERE IS MUCH TO CELEBRATE as we look back on 2021, despite the COVID-19 pandemic, which has continued to dominate life. We began the year with all our worship online and no in-person services, but we have ended the year with a full return to masked

in-person worship, which is also streamed online. At the start of the year our sanctuary looked like a building site as the renovation work funded by the 125th Anniversary Capital Campaign was in full swing. On Homecoming Sunday in September we were able to welcome the parish back to a fully renovated sanctuary. We saw 30 confirmands, whose confirmation had been postponed in 2020, confirmed in October. On St. Andrew's Day we had an almost full church as we celebrated our patronal festival complete with a bagpiper and a chance visit by the Bishop of Argyll & the Isles from the Scottish Episcopal Church, The Rt. Rev. Dr. Keith Riglin, who happened to be in town visiting family. It has been a joy to hear the organ and the choir singing again "live." It has also been very encouraging to welcome new members to St. Andrew's who have started attending in person since we reopened for worship in September. But perhaps one of the greatest things to celebrate has been seeing each other in person after so many months apart.

I have been thinking about the early Christian church, as I reflect upon the difference between the tone of how we operated last year in the face of the initial phase of the pandemic and the altered set of challenges we have faced this past year with the pandemic. In the years immediately after the death and resurrection of Christ, there was a sense of an immediate crisis with the expectation of an imminent second coming of Christ and the inauguration of the end time. Everyone knew what they had to do: prepare for the return of Christ. But when the early Christians realized that they had misunderstood God's intention and that there was not to be an immediate second coming, they had to ask themselves a new question, "What

does it mean to live as Christians for the long haul?" Similarly, last year when the pandemic first struck we all knew what we had to do: go into lockdown and work hard on developing online worship and ways to stay connected. However, this year—with the continuation of the pandemic, but without that sense of immediate crisis—we have had to ask a new question, "What does it mean to be a parish in a less predictable world in which COVID will continue to be a factor?"

There are certain words and phrases that spring instantly to mind as I reflect on how we have had to respond to the second year of the pandemic. These include "pivoting," "hybrid," "adaptability," "leaning into," "connectedness," "keeping calm and carrying on," "hope," and "God is with us." These words and phrases capture the spirit with which St. Andrew's has sought to keep our faith community alive and connected to God and each other in the face of the challenges of the second year of COVID. And we have learned to be good at these things!

It has been a gift to see how parishioners and staff members have worked so hard to keep the life of our parish humming along during this challenging time. One impact of COVID has been a noticeable drop off in the number of volunteers helping us to run the ministries of the church. This has meant that the heads of ministries and the remaining volunteers have worked extra hard to ensure that their ministry areas continue to be able to do their work, whether it be the altar guild, the choir, the ushers, the readers, church school, fellowship, or membership.

I would like to thank all our staff who have worked so hard in challenging and unpredictable circumstances. I would like to thank Wardie Mannix and Amanda Kern for their music ministry, Kate Clark who has so ably managed our office and technology, Susan Jackson for her work with the children, Steve Killeen for overseeing our church building, Joanne Butler for handling the church accounts, and for my clergy colleagues, Margaret Schwarzer, Mia Kano, and Karen Vickers Budney for their work as priests.

Since the relaunch of in-person services on

Homecoming Sunday in September our in-person Sunday attendance has been roughly 60 percent of pre-pandemic levels. But when we add to that the parishioners watching online, this number swells to between 75% and 85%. This has further reinforced to us the importance of our investments in technology to allow us to stream our services online. As well as streaming our Sunday services, we have continued to offer online Morning Prayer each weekday continuing our partnership with St. Michael's in Holliston. This allows us to connect with parishioners who do not feel safe to return to in-person worship and to connect with parishioners when they are away for the weekend. We have also found that some parishioners who have moved from the area are staying connected through our online services.

As we have sought to find new ways to be the church from a practical point of view, we have always kept in mind our call to be disciples of Christ and to share God's transforming love in the forefront of everything we do. In many ways, this has not been hard because the challenge of the pandemic has focused our minds on what is truly important in life—to love God and to love our neighbor as ourselves. One particular manifestation of this great commandment from Christ has been our commitment to racial justice, as symbolized by the banner the vestry voted to place outside

the church reading, "We are committed to racial justice. As Jesus said, 'Love your neighbor as yourself."

Finally, I would like to thank our vestry and our two wardens, Paige Manning and Will Nystrom, for their work during this challenging time. I especially want to thank our wardens for a critical role in helping to lead the parish amid all the difficulties that the pandemic has thrown at us. St. Andrew's has been very blessed by their wisdom, insight, and dedication during this most turbulent time.

I would particularly like to thank Paige Manning, who completes her term as warden at the annual meeting, for her dedication and hard work over the last three years. Paige has brought to her leadership role at St. Andrew's her incisive intellect, her lawyer's ability to analyze and understand situations, and her deep commitment to following Christ. Paige has joked that she will be remembered as the "COVID warden." And certainly, her many talents and her faith have made her an outstanding warden as we have faced the unprecedented challenge of the pandemic.

# Report of the Associate Rector for Adult Formation and Membership

THE YEAR 2021 has been a hopeful but challenging year. We find ourselves in both an in-person and an online world, working hard to stay connected, curious, and faithful. Both the adult formation committee and the membership committee have

engaged new strategies to stay connected with our parishioners in an unprecedented time. I continue to be thankful for the opportunity to worship and work with our St. Andrew's community as we deepen our faith and share the love of Christ with our neighbors in this hybrid year.

#### **Adult Formation Advisory Committee**

Our adult formation committee and I share in the mission of Christian education for adults at St. Andrew's. Your feedback and interests guide the topics we choose, so please share your interests and questions with me or a member of our committee. I am thankful for the service and creativity of our members who served in 2021: Chair Ansley Martin, Peter Fergusson, Carrie Hawley, Laura Brown MacKinnon, Will Nystrom, Cynthia Scott, Carol Shedd, Paul Shellito, and Sandy Warren. A special welcome to Cynthia Scott and Sandy Warren, who joined our committee this year. I'm especially thankful for the strong leadership of our stalwart chair, Ansley Martin. He is dedicated

to building up opportunities for adult learning and Christian formation; our committee gets a lot done and has fun doing it under his leadership.

#### Adult Formation and Learning

This year, adult formation went hybrid, offering our Bible Circles, Men's Bible Study, and 9am Christian learning in online, in-person, and hybrid modes. Monthly Bible Circles and Adrian's monthly Men's Bible Study have continued to have an average of 30 parishioners studying scripture monthly. In Advent, Adrian's "Luke Bible Challenge" pulled in many parishioners and had many joining Adrian in a Zoom call for Wednesdays in Advent. In 2021, our Bible Circle studied Gospels, the Book of Acts, and Epistles to consider St. Peter and his role in forming our church. Men's Bible Study studied Romans. Our 9am Christian learning series, which meets approximately 28 times per year, has averaged 24 members per class, and we have had over 70 people attending at least one Christian learning series class this past year. We held our Lenten program online this past March, sharing both our 9am classes and our Lenten program with St. Michael's, Holliston and their rector, the Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole. We appreciate the talents and fellowship they brought to our shared life together in the winter and spring. This year, our Holy Monday Taizé-style service was online, and our Advent service was in the sanctuary. I want to offer particular thanks to the members of our Advent Taizé-style meditative working group: D.D. Alexander, Laura Brown MacKinnon, Liz Parsons, Jenny Sawyer, Cynthia Scott, and Carol Shedd. I also want to thank Wardie Mannix, Amanda Kern, members of our senior and junior choirs, and Katharine Clark for the beautiful music and arrangement of our pre-recorded Holy Monday Taizé-style service. Our 2021 Blue Christmas service continued to offer space and support for people who are facing significant loss or challenges during the Christmas season. We were not able to offer "Ashes-To-Go" in 2021 because of the pandemic restrictions. It was a true pleasure to serve as the facilitator and editor for the fifth Lenten Meditation Guide written by St. Andrew's parishioners. In 2021, we printed over 460 copies, mailing a copy to every household in our active parishioner list and sending a daily email to 126 people who asked to get emails of the guide online. In November, the Wellesley Turkey Trot, back in person this year, had approximately 45 members of St. Andrew's participating on our team. The event was also virtual and some of our church members joined the race that way. We could not safely staff a water table for the race this year.

We were able to have a joint learning experience with Temple Beth Elohim in 2021. In June, four clergy women from the Roman Catholic, Jewish, Episcopal, and Unitarian traditions joined together on Zoom to reflect on the religious life of women leaders and our traditions' worshipping experiences. I joined Rabbi Rachel Saphire and two other clergy women presenters for a Zoom event that gathered approximately 100 people. Our plans for local field trips had to be put on hold because of the pandemic. Faith & Practice classes, offered as forums for parishioners to share and reflect upon the practice of our daily faith, continue to be vital and engaging. Two were held on Zoom this spring, and two were held in person this fall. Please turn to our adult formation committee report for more details about our offerings this year.

#### **Membership Committee**

It has been a pleasure to work with our membership committee in 2021. I want to welcome Ntonhle Kekana, who joined our committee this year. Despite the challenges of the pandemic, we have had approximately 25 new families join us as seekers or newcomers this year; many newcomers have brought young children into the church. We continue to welcome seekers and help integrate newcomers into our parish. We hosted our Kids' Place coffee this year (outside). We couldn't hold our Newcomers Brunch, but under the leadership of Elizabeth Clarke, we sent welcome bags with St. Andrew's mugs, shortbread cookies, and a welcome note to newcomers' homes. We continue to greet people at the start of each Sunday service, and speak with newcomers and seekers after each service, insuring their welcome. Our membership committee gives each newly baptized child at St. Andrew's a beautiful picture book celebrating their baptism. "St. Andrew's Strong" bracelets also continued to be passed out in 2021. Please turn to our membership committee report for more details about our work this year.

I enjoy being the clergy liaison for our membership committee. My main responsibilities lie in welcoming newcomers by email or phone so that they have an immediate clergy welcome. I also meet with newcomers who would like to discuss their faith and help newcomers learn more about our parish. I'm especially thankful for Elizabeth Clarke, chair of our committee. She has been creative and faithful during this challenging year; it is a joy to work with her.

#### **Wellesley College Ministry**

In 2021, Wellesley College students have continued to worship at our 8am, 10am, 5pm, and online services. Two college students were confirmed this spring, one student sang in our adult choir, and one student wrote for our Lenten Meditation Guide. This fall, six Wellesley students have worshipped with us in-person and several more have been worshipping with us online. Unfortunately, due to the pandemic, I have not met students from the class of 2024 or 2025 yet. Our Wellesley College ministry benefits from a diocesan

grant we secured through the Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole, Chaplain at Wellesley College. I reach out to our students with a weekly newsletter, and we encourage students to join us for coffee hours and other special events. Our ministry with Wellesley College students continues to bring creativity, energy, and enthusiasm into our congregation's life.

Like all of us, I'm thankful for a year that has held some hybrid and in- person fellowship and ministry, an improvement from last year's strictly online experience. I'm prayerful that our lives will continue to move towards more normal times as we stay "St. Andrew's Strong" in our worship, learning, and fellowship.

# Report of the Assistant Rector for Youth and Family

THIS PAST YEAR has once again proved remarkable. Our youth programs were defined by our slow and deliberate transition from all-virtual to in-person gatherings.

We continued our all-ages virtual church school classroom

through the spring, building up a small community of 15 children from pre-K to fifth grade. Our church school families celebrated virtual equivalents of our key special events: Epiphany Fireside, Shrove Tuesday, Celebrating the Passover Story, and Good Friday Hot Cross Buns. We rejoiced in the first communion of five children at our outdoor services in April and May. We closed out our program year with a Pentecost celebration in the parking lot!

I am most proud of the outstanding work our church school curriculum review team completed this spring. The team decided to divide the church school into two curricula that better fit with the formational needs and abilities of different age ranges. The two curricula selected by the committee are more than just a shift in content; they are an evolution in church school pedagogy and theology. Some of the key changes build on what we learned from community service learning, one "room" all ages Zoom church school, and children's worship leadership during the pandemic. We gradually phased in the new curricula with a later start at the end of September. We greatly appreciate our teachers, D.D. Alexander, Matthew Benfer, Bianka Eichelberger, Caleb Farny, Erica Gelser, Pamela Grossetti, Eliot Heher, Ntonhle Kekana, Yael Kushner, and Steve Mahoney,

Peter Rankin, Scott Schmitz, Ellen Staelin, Coryell Urban, and Anna Lee Wahls, for enthusiastically diving into a new way of teaching.

Lower church school is using a Montessori-style approach that celebrates children's spirituality called "Godly Play." Children engage with our faith's foundational stories by wondering alongside adult leaders and then choosing how they'd like to reflect on the

story through art and play. We're so blessed that our clergy have delighted in spending part of Sunday services with the children. We began Godly Play in late September with a full child-friendly Eucharist service for all elementary children outside on the playground. With worsening weather, dropping COVID rates, and expanded vaccination eligibility, we included preschoolers, spilt off the fourth and fifth grades, and moved inside to the children's chapel.

Upper church school is a hybrid curriculum guided by "Love First" principles. Love First conceives of children as ministers of the church and emphasizes deeper engagement with scripture that teaches love of self, God, and neighbor. Throughout the year, guests from various ministries of the church teach the upper schoolers how their ministry is an expression of their faith. The children participate in the ministry on Sunday morning through small, but impactful handson activities. Four times a year, the children also play a leadership role in the worship: St. Andrew's Day, Christmas Pageant, Youth Sunday, and Pentecost. Youth Sunday 2021 was a virtual service lead by both St. Michael's and St. Andrew's children, featuring confirmation class sermons, junior choir music, children's animations, and readings.

Under Amanda Kern's creative vision, junior choir persevered in meeting and performing virtually for the parish. The inclusion of our youngest voices in Youth Sunday and Easter services was especially appreciated! Before vaccine eligibility for children, junior choir met outdoors and found inventive ways to engage in musical ministry together, such as by leading the children in signing the Sanctus in American Sign Language during outdoor children's Eucharist. This St. Andrew's Day, junior choir led our children in teaching the parish to sign the Sanctus as well. As I write this, Amanda is planning and preparing for an in-person pageant once more.

Rite-13 finished out their virtual year in May 2021 and returned to meeting in-person in September 2021. Many thanks to our outgoing leaders, Toni Jolley and Tim Raeke, and to our current and new leaders, Lee Eichelberger, Heidi Emerson, Judy Marth, and Greg Urban. Our leaders are excited to be using the updated Rite-13 curriculum, published in August 2021.

Confirmation class 2020-2021 finished out their Zoom year with an in-person Eucharist celebration in May. Youth shared reflections on their Bibles in front of families and mentors. Our Bishops finally confirmed 24 youth from the classes of 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 together in outdoor confirmations in early fall. Our new class of 2021-2022 is meeting in person with seven students who are each working with individual mentors. We deeply appreciate this year's and last year's mentors for wholeheartedly listening, guiding, and supporting their confirmands!

Our youth group met sporadically on Zoom throughout the spring and came together in person outdoors to put together gift boxes for our outgoing seniors. Acolytes started back up with in-person sanctuary services in September, led by our acolyte wrangler, Wendy Barry. The youth group spearheaded the intergenerational college care package project in partnership with the Wily Network and youth group alumni joined us for a Christmas party reunion in December. Much thanks to our youth group advisors, Matthew Benfer, Rob Brandt, and Marie Dunell.

This year leaves me even more grateful for our Christian learning coordinator, Susan Jackson, if that's at all possible! Susan held down the fort while I was on maternity leave. She organized and prepared our classrooms for our new curricula, including Godly Play story and response rooms. Our church school committee is small but mighty, led by the fearless Coryell Urban, who has weathered the changes and challenges of her COVID-19 chairwomanship with grace and thoughtfulness.

The beautiful baby shower for my son in May and his baptism celebration in November were unforget-table highlights of a very memorable year. I am filled with gratitude for the steadfastness and generosity of this parish, and most especially for the resilience of our parents, children, and youth.

## Report of the Music Minister

IN JUNE OF 2021, I completed my 14th year as music minister at St. Andrew's.

Our music program began the year 2021 online as renovations of our sanctuary continued through early June, when our organ was finally unwrapped.

I am indebted to Village Church, Wellesley College, Old West Church in Boston, and Church of the Redeemer in Chestnut Hill for permitting me to practice on their instruments during the time of our renovations. The Church of the Redeemer also allowed us to record anthems for our services at their church.

Special recognition continues to go to Katharine Clark and Amanda Kern who have made this technological feat possible. Their tireless efforts to bring the music we recorded to our online congregation, resulting in some very beautiful services, is beyond words. We simply could not have done it without them. Special recognition also goes to Peter Lull who spent countless hours by himself, and with Kate and Amanda, video recording hymns and choral music. Thank you, Peter.

Another facet of our adaption to online services was dealing with the copyright issue. During this past year, Liz Dean, a member of our senior choir, has painstakingly catalogued every piece of music we sing and play with One License, so that we remain in compliance with the law. As of September, Sandy Warren, has taken over this task. We are indebted to Liz and Sandy for this necessary work.

We continued to hold senior choir rehearsals on Zoom every Thursday through the end of May. Sunday services returned to the sanctuary at the beginning of August. On September 9, we resumed our regular in-person Thursday evening choir rehearsals in the sanctuary of the church.

We hired three new section leaders this fall: Stella Fitzgerald, alto; Thai Johnson, tenor; and Benedict

Hensley, baritone. Laura Cervinsky, a mainstay of the choir, continues to be our soprano section leader. Her dedication over the past 14 years has been invaluable. Amanda Kern, our junior choir director, has been singing with the senior choir in our Sunday services as of the beginning of September 2021. Amanda has also handled much of the livestreaming sound, which has proven to be indispensable. Her knowledge of music, positioning of the mics, and adjustment of the sound levels is essential.

We celebrated All Saints' Day on Sunday, October 31, and St. Andrew's Day on Sunday, November 21, with Iain Massie playing the pipes.

On December 5, we held our Advent Lessons & Carols Service with a choir of 18 singers and Thomas Handel playing the organ. It was a pared down version considering the continuing presence of COVID. The children's Christmas Pageant was on Sunday, December 19. Once again, it was a pared down version that Amanda Kern directed beautifully.

We had three services on Christmas Eve: 3pm, 5pm with only a quartet singing, and 10pm with a thirteenmember senior choir and a string quartet. Once again, it was a pared down service and I sought to keep the number of choir members at a minimum due to CO-VID. On Sunday, December 26, the service was online, and we used music we had previously recorded.

Jonathan Ambrosino continues to take care of our Juget-Sinclair organ, which is due for its 15-year tune-up this spring by the builders, Juget-Sinclair, of Montreal. Anthony McKenna tunes our pianos.

## Wardens' Report

WHAT A DIFFERENCE A YEAR CAN MAKE! As 2020 wound down and 2021 began, most of our interactions with St. Andrew's were via remote connections, and the physical buildings were closed to all but necessary staff. Like everything else, normal parish life was affected in many ways by the pandemic—modified and adapted—but still going forward, still happening, still available and welcoming through online worship services, live and recorded, complete with wonderful music, and with conference calls and Zoom video meetings for committees, coffee hours, forums, and classes. We bent to meet the challenges of social distancing and remote interactions, but we did not break! Our parish remains strong, vital, and resilient!

As 2021 unfolded, and restrictions loosened, we were able to cautiously begin reopening, at first with small outdoor services and gatherings, then later with the autumn resumption of indoor services, albeit with masks. We have continued to stream our services online, and to provide remote access to many meetings and classes, in a hybrid model that accommodates those who are not yet able to attend in person. As I am writing this, I have just enjoyed our Christmas pageant in person with our youth and choir beautifully retelling the story of the birth of Jesus. Advent began with our traditional Taizé-style service and Lessons & Carols service, each of which provides a time of reflection and prayer to prepare for the coming of Christ. Preparations are now in full swing by our clergy and many committees to host our joyful Christmas services in person (and streaming). As 2021 draws to a close, we are hopeful but vigilant, keeping an eye on pandemic news and doing our best to remain open while staying healthy and safe in 2022.

Through all the ups and downs of the pandemic, we have been blessed by the steady leadership and guidance of our clergy and staff. The burden of shifting so much around, and so fast, began in early 2020, as we shifted almost overnight to remote worship and meetings. The innovations continued, as we got better equipped and better attuned to the new ways of running the parish. We are particularly grateful to Kate Clark for quickly upgrading our technology and software, and to Mia for expanding our social media presence. Joanne kept the financial operations humming, even as we went remote right after she joined the staff! Throughout the spring and summer, we continued to benefit from our partnership with St. Michael's in Holliston, with joint services streamed out for both congregations. Moving to the current hybrid, in-person plus remote streaming operation last fall required further adjustments and refinements, all accomplished smoothly.

It is notable that our clergy Adrian, Margaret, Mia, and Karen, plus music leaders Wardie and Amanda, managed to continue performing virtually all their ordinary duties, on top of pivoting in and out of remote services, meetings, and rehearsals, with new technologies and health measures. It has been an interesting two years, to put it mildly! Adrian was able to take a well-earned summer sabbatical during the summer, returning in time to oversee our fall reopening. In addition to catching up on inspirational readings and meditations, we understand that he also spent relaxing time with Napoleon Bonaparte and Arthur Wellesley, the Duke of Wellington, adding to their miniature armies in his impressive basement Battle of Waterloo diorama.

After months of working with Susan to develop creative adaptations for remote and hybrid youth classes, the new Godly Play curricula for church school, Rite-13, confirmation classes, and youth group events, Mia had a very different kind of summer break—maternity leave! She and her husband Aaron welcomed their first child, son August Cyrus Kano (who has made his acting debut as baby Jesus in the 2021 Christmas Pageant). Many lucky parishioners were able to celebrate the happy occasion with a

parish baby shower (in person!) and later by witnessing baby August's baptism ceremony.

All this meant that Margaret had an interesting summer, as she was the sole clergy member on duty through those months! Many thanks to Margaret for admirably holding down the parish during this time and smoothly managing all the ongoing church details and functions. Margaret also did a tremendous job running many remote adult formation classes and discussions first online and then in person throughout the year.

What we hoped would be a brief interruption to our routines in early 2020 extended into the fall, and then into 2021. When it became apparent that we would be mostly closed for that long, we found a silver lining by speeding up the 125th Anniversary Capital Campaign renovations to the sanctuary, narthex, and children's chapel, to get them done while the building was largely unoccupied. We also made a timely addition to the project, adding high efficiency air filtration and air conditioning to the sanctuary ventilation system. We are very grateful to Jim Blackwell and members of the property committee for overseeing this project, and to our sexton Steve Killeen and crew for facilitating the construction crew's labors. Please check out the many improvements soon, if you haven't done so already.

As we gradually reopened in the late summer and early fall of 2021, it was wonderful to begin seeing each other in person again and to be able to renew some of our normal traditions. We enjoyed a wonderful parish picnic in September on the grounds of Luisa Hunnewell's lovely home, with a healthy attendance of over 150 people. In-person worship services began with 8am dates, then expanded to 10am as we figured out the adjustments, and how to sing with masks on. It was so wonderful to be back in the sanctuary, with live lessons, sermons, and music! Church school and Rite-13 classes resumed in person, as well as youth group meetings and adult learning classes. We had a lovely fall fellowship gathering on the church lawn with an Octoberfest theme. Coventry supper groups resumed, with in-person meals and

fellowship. We had our bagpiper leading the procession for our St. Andrew's Day service, followed by a delicious coffee hour assortment of shortbread cookies, and shared the Thanksgiving packing of food bags for St. Stephen's. We again fielded a large team of Wellesley Turkey Trotters on Thanksgiving Day! We may be masked, we may be socially spaced, but it certainly feels good to return to a semblance of our normal routines.

Our annual stewardship drive to fund 2021 provided a firm financial foundation for the work of the parish in the past year as we exceeded our pledge target reaching \$1,085,000 in gifts and pledges. This was especially meaningful, given that we were largely remote from one another during the fall 2020 campaign. Thanks to all for your continued support and faith in our parish and our missions! Our current campaign for 2022, "Our Spiritual Home: The Future Together," is approaching our goal of maintaining that level and restoring our pledge participation to pre-pandemic levels. Many thanks to all who have already pledged, and we strongly encourage others to join in—it's never too late to pledge your support for St. Andrew's!

As my tenure as warden comes to a close, I would like to take a moment to thank you for the honor of serving as warden these past three years, first with David Hamlin, who taught me so much about the role, and this past year with Will Nystrom, who will be joined by incoming warden Megan Burns. Along with new and continuing vestry members and all the countless volunteers and committee members, St. Andrew's is in good hands going forward! My tenure began with anticipation of our 125th Anniversary celebration, which was truly a wonderful occasion. The last two years have been fulfilling in a different way, as I had a front row seat to the amazing resiliency and robustness of our parish as we adapted to and overcame the challenges of the pandemic. I look forward to sitting in my seat at the back of the sanctuary to witness the faith and good works of the St. Andrew's family unfolding in 2022 and beyond.

# **Vestry Committee Reports**

## Report of the Vestryperson for Adult Formation

WE BEGAN 2021 CONTINUING THE STRONG WORK established by our dedicated adult formation and Christian learning committee and Rev. Margaret Schwarzer. Our programming settled in well to a virtual setting due to the ongoing pandemic. We maintained a stable and consistent cadence and rhythm to the programming as we aimed to offer spaces for reflection, inspiration, and engagement. But this year also blessed us with opportunity to gather in person once again and for this we are most grateful.

The Christian learning series, our most robust programming effort, featured an array of topics. The programming began with a reflection on The Baptismal Covenant and then understanding the life and messaging of Bishop Michael Curry from his book, Love is the Way: Holding Onto Hope in Troubling Times. The Rev. Dr. Jim Weiss of Boston College presented on Our Lifelong Development of Faith. There was the exploration of the life and times of Jesus through Thomas Cahill's book, Desire of the Everlasting Hills: The World Before and After Jesus. As we transitioned to in-person gatherings, our topics focused on themes such as Choosing Strength and Acknowledging Losses, Heaven and Hell, and the Roots of our Faith and Christmas Spirituality. We are especially grateful for Dr. Rob Evans, psychologist and former executive director of Human Relations Service in Wellesley for offering two sessions on to Good Grief: Coming to terms with COVID Losses.

We explored the Baha'i Faith, Islam's perspective of Heaven and Hell, and Lutheran depictions of Christ's diversity through the artist Emmanuel Vigeland. We devoted sessions to important and inspiring women in the Bible such as Eve, Rachel, and Esther. We discussed Bishop Michael Curry and attorney Bryan Stevenson's podcast episode titled *The Blessings of Mercy*. We wish to extend our gratitude to those who presented on these topics as well as others: Kevin Andrews, Dr. Virginia Chieffo Raguin, Distinguished Professor of Humanities Emerita at Holy Cross College, Emma Barry, Laura Brown MacKinnon, Joanna

Horobin, Cam McCormick, Bethany House of Prayer, and of course, Adrian, Margaret, and Mia. A hearty "Thank You" is also extended to Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole and the St. Michael's community for their contributions and involvement with our Christian learning programming the first half of the year.

Our Wednesday Night Lenten Program presented the theme Finding Our Way to Grace: Temptation, Suffering, and Hope. Topics included reflections on the book Time and Despondency: Regaining the Present in Faith and Life by Dr. Nicole Roccas and C.S. Lewis's book The Screwtape Letters. There was a dialogue on "How to Be with Children in Suffering and Hope" as well as the exploration of "Hope from a Jewish Perspective." The Lenten series concluded with "A Mediation on Grace—Spiritual Directors from Bethany House of Prayer." We wish to acknowledge our gratitude to Rabbi Rachel Saphire, Associate Rabbi, Temple Beth Elohim, who has for nine years been an integral part of our Lenten series, offering us erudite insights and perspectives that we as Christians can ruminate and reflect upon in our own faith.

An unexpected consequence of the pandemic has been the knowledge gained in the use of technology. Specific programming can now be in a hybrid format: in person as well as online. Although many have participated in the Christian Learning Series in person, we are thrilled that those who are unable to attend can still be part of the program. Our Taizé-style service for was online for Easter, but was in-person only for our Advent service, as was our Blue Christmas service. We are ever hopeful we may be able to bring the potluck dinner back to our Wednesday evening Lenten program.

However, our regular Christian learning programming continued to thrive in a virtual format. Whether it was the Christian learning series, Bible Circle, or the Men's Bible/book clubs, interest and attendance reflected pre-pandemic levels and grew in some areas. One significant change involved our collaboration with Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole and St. Michael's

Episcopal Church. We enjoyed the shared responsibility and engagement between the two parishes in the offerings for the Christian learning series, Bible Circle, and adult confirmation classes, which involved 14 confirmands from St. Andrew's, St. Michael's, and Wellesley College.

When we were operating on a strictly virtual format, we unfortunately had to eliminate events such as the college coffee meetings, Wellesley College retreats/workshops/programming, and a field trip to the MFA, as well as suspend planning for our pilgrimage to England. Our hope for 2022 will be to start to incorporate these types of events.

The adult formation and Christian learning committee oversees two other offerings: The Lenten Mediation Guide and the Turkey Trot. This past year we put in the budget the cost to print and mail a copy of the guide to every household since parishioners did not have an opportunity to pick up a guide at church. We are grateful for Katharine Clark and Jenny Saw-

yer who oversaw and coordinated this undertaking. Parishioners also had the option of receiving daily online Lenten Mediations. Regarding the Turkey Trot, we were thrilled that our St. Andrew's Team had the option to participate in person and gather pre-race to share in fellowship and support for a great cause. We appreciate Peter Lull for documenting the occasion.

As a committee, we charge ourselves with constantly assessing and evaluating our offerings to ensure their quality, relevance, and interest to a broad reach of our parish. Our committee continues to be discerning as well as nimble when it comes to program development and execution. Thank you: Laura Brown MacKinnon, Peter Fergusson, Carrie Hawley, Margarethe Kulke (rest in peace), Mary Scanlon, Cynthia Scott, Carol Shedd, Paul Shellito, and Sandy Warren for your dedicated service. Thank you, Rev. Margaret Schwarzer for your sage advice and stalwart leadership.

## Report of the Vestryperson for Communication

WITH THE CHALLENGES OF COVID PERSISTING into 2021, St. Andrew's priorities continued to focus on the safety of the church's clergy, staff, volunteers, and parishioners. The digital space remained critical and central to all communications efforts as church operations, worship services, programming, and events depended on technology. The St. Andrew's community grew in its proficiency and comfort with electronic communications to the degree that even after in-person services returned in September 2021, many congregants chose to continue worshipping from the safety of their homes.

- Daily email communications from the clergy started in January and tapered in the fall to about three per week, supporting the online calendar and adding additional context while providing parishioners with a sense of connectivity.
- The number of social media followers and relevant/relatable content increased across all platforms and helped add to the number of church members who were either new or returning to St. Andrew's.

- The ever-evolving St. Andrew's website grew in its importance as the epicenter of information for parishioners. Administrator Katharine Clark leveraged the site to provide immediately accessible updates on virtual services, programs, and activities, and a virtual calendar provided an easyto-understand, week-by-week schedule that was updated often.
- For the first eight months of the year, services continued to be offered in the virtual space, including Sunday worship, morning prayer, and compline. Parishioners became increasingly adept with linking to services through whichever platform best served their particular needs—including the website (through Vimeo), YouTube, and Facebook. Christian learning for children, youth, and adults; choir rehearsals; and social/fellowship activities maintained their virtual schedule as well.
- As the future of in-person services and activities
  was unknown at the outset of the year, St. Andrew's
  began testing livestreaming services early in the
  year. Parishioner Rob Brandt was unwavering in

supporting our efforts with his technical expertise and, along with key staff partners Katharine Clark and Amanda Kern, as well as external resources, we successfully launched livestreamed services for parishioners who prefer to continue to worship from home—and can now feel even more connected to both their faith and St. Andrew's as they experience Sunday 10am services in real time. Broadcast volunteers assisting Sunday services are: Rob Brandt, Greg Hunter, Sophie Hunter, Peter Lull, Bruce MacKinnon, Linda Sperry, and Kwan Zhang. COVID was not the only concern or issue of 2021, as social justice became a highly important and emotional topic for global society. As our neighboring churches displayed banners proclaiming their position of anti-racism, St. Andrew's undertook a differ-

ent approach, inviting parishioners to participate in

a deeper discussion on how we should articulate our position. Together with the vestry, we determined that a non-political, scripture-driven message was our preferred direction; accordingly, a new banner proclaiming that we are "committed to anti-racism" and we follow the teachings of Jesus Christ to "love your neighbor as yourself" was created and displayed on the church in the spring.

In the fall St. Andrew's welcomed the return of in-person Blessing of the Animals which was enthusiastically attended by the greater community and covered by the Wellesley Townsman. A resurgence of COVID at the end of the year impacted in-person attendance at Christmas Eve services, but livestreaming provided pandemic-weary parishioners with an alternative for worshipping during such a sacred time.

# Report of the Vestryperson for Human Resources

Now, discipline always seems painful rather than pleasant at the time, but later it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who have trained by it. —Hebrews 12:11

AT ST. ANDREW'S, WE ARE BLESSED with a staff of lay and clergy persons who have had the courage to embrace change. This discipline of adapting, learning, and reinventing has been expedited by the social constraints brought about by the pandemic which continues to inflict difficulties on our world. Operating for a second year under pandemic conditions has sped up the implementation of online church services and heightened the importance of communications and technology. In addition to Sunday services, Christian education, baptisms, funerals, and meetings of all types have taken advantage of virtual technologies. St. Andrew's human resources will address these realities when considering skill sets required for future staffing positions.

The Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts has encouraged us to apply for an Employee Retention Credit offered by the federal government. By doing so, St. Andrew's would be in good company as many parishes, both large and small, have already completed the process which recognizes the church's commitment to its dedicated employees, even when the pandemic precluded them from performing their usual tasks.

The HR Committee would like to recognize the fortitude and nimbleness of our St. Andrew's clergy and staff who tirelessly delivered their best efforts under the extraordinary circumstances of the past year. Adrian has provided fearless leadership, tackled the challenges of virtual services, and then executed the restoration of in-person worship this fall. Margaret provided a robust program of Christian learning to a substantial audience by adapting to a hybrid model of meeting both virtually and in-person. While Adrian was on sabbatical and Mia was on maternity leave, Margaret heroically served as sole clergy person to the

entire congregation. We should also acknowledge the tremendous contribution to our Sunday worship services by the Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole of St. Michael's parish in Holliston. During the first half of the year, Mia had to set aside her prescribed role of managing youth programs, which had been largely suspended due to social distancing protocols. Instead, she gracefully pivoted to supporting the church's technological needs by generously sharing her tech expertise. When the church reopened this fall, Mia was happy to return to her true role of working with children and teens, helping to introduce the new "Godly Play" curriculum to church school. Karen Budney's work in reaching out to parishioners and providing pastoral care has been very important during the pandemic when social distancing has made maintaining contact with parishioners more challenging.

While the clergy attended to our spiritual wellbeing, the staff cared for our spiritual home. Joanne Butler was hired at the beginning of the pandemic to replace Ruth Hubert as financial administrator and has proved invaluable to church operations and a quick study in learning our systems. She has been actively involved with updating the church database, particularly the financial component of the system. We are very grateful to Ruth for her willingness to support Joanne through this transition. Katharine Clark, our stalwart parish administrator, has been instrumental in adopting new technologies for church operations and encouraging us to seek the advantages offered by online communications. Wardie Mannix, as music minister, had the Herculean task of hiring a fresh set of section leaders for the choir, given the impact of the pandemic on music conservatories in Boston. She has also worked hard to rebuild and regather choir members from the congregation. Music continues to be a source of inspiration among parishioners and appreciated as a key component to the in-person worship experience. Amanda Kern ordinarily directs the children's choir,

but during the church closure, also played an important role in bringing music to online services. Susan Jackson has been very busy relaunching church school and introducing the Godly Play program to our children. Steve Killeen played an essential role during the renovations to the church building and upon their completion, resumed his traditional work of care and maintenance.

The Episcopal Church acknowledges the incredible yoke imposed on its clergy and provides for a sabbatical period of three months for refreshment every five to seven years. Adrian had been entitled to take his in

2020 but had postponed his plans due to the onset of the pandemic and church closures. While he did manage to finally take his sabbatical from May through July of 2021, he had to forgo his intended travel to observe programs at other churches to enjoy a more reflective and introspective approach to spiritual refreshment.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my predecessor in this role, Frank Hunnewell, for providing all the resources and guidance I have needed to support Adrian in HR matters over the past year.

Normally, we would be inviting adult newcomers to an inside brunch to meet with clergy, other staff members, wardens, and the membership committee. While we were unable to do that this year, we instead delivered welcome bags to new members containing a St. Andrew's coffee mug, packets of shortbread, "St. Andrew's Strong" bracelets and a welcome note. They were very well received!

Membership continues to work with fellowship to create Coventry Supper/Cocktail groups. After being all-virtual with nine Coventry Cocktail groups in 2020-21, we now have one virtual group and seven in-person Coventry Supper groups. THE PASTORAL CARE TEAM is made up of lay people and the St. Andrew's clergy. It is an example of the partnership between lay people and clergy in the parish and it plays an important role in the provision of pastoral care at St. Andrew's. Members visit parishioners in their homes and in hospitals, nursing homes, and other residential communities.

The bulk of pastoral care at St. Andrew's takes place on an informal basis with parishioners reaching out and caring for each other in times of need. But the pastoral care team plays an important role in looking systematically at the provision of pastoral care to ensure no parishioners in need "fall through the cracks" of the more informal provision of pastoral care. It also has an important symbolic role through its work of showing parishioners in need that St. Andrew's is concerned about them.

In the first half of 2021, the more "locked down" conditions of the pandemic, prior to the availability of

vaccines, heavily impacted the way that the lay pastoral care team has traditionally operated. Pandemic safety protocols meant that it was not possible to visit parishioners in their homes, in hospitals, nursing homes, or other residential communities. Nor was it possible for the team to have its monthly in-person meetings.

However, after the summer with the vaccines allowing the reopening of the church, the pastoral care team has resumed its visiting activities and monthly in-person meetings.

Since the team started meeting again after the summer it has been undertaking a self-assessment. There have been three areas of focus in the review: the recruitment of new members to the team; an updating of those in need of "chronic" or ongoing pastoral care; and a review of the scope of the pastoral care team activities. This review is still currently underway.

# Report of the Vestryperson for Outreach

THE PRIMARY OBJECTIVE of the St. Andrew's outreach ministry is to help our congregation put our Christian faith into action. Throughout 2021 the COVID-19 pandemic continued to impact our outreach partners, leading some to change their models as they adapted to a more "virtual" world and limitations on in-person volunteers. We, too, had to adapt, but the generosity of the St. Andrew's community meant that while our methods changed, our outreach partners continued to get the financial and other support they have come to rely on from St. Andrew's. Highlights of our outreach work for 2021 follow.

# Metrowest/Local outreach partners and activities

1. Family Promise Metrowest

Our relationship with Family Promise Metrowest
(FPM), a cooperative interfaith partnership helping families with housing insecurity through safe transitional shelter, meals, and case management,

- continues to be a positive opportunity to live our faith.
- In 2021 families continued to be sheltered in a hotel. This model, while expensive, has been quite successful. Given the inability to predict a return to the previous model of accommodating families by rotating through local houses of worship, FPM has decided to convert part of their Natick headquarters into three family units, with a planned completion date of April 2022.
- The SAIL (Sustaining Achievements for Independent living) program has been successful in preparing families for transition from shelter into permanent housing and continuing to support them once placed. The LIFE (Local Initiative for Family Empowerment) program is designed to support families at risk of eviction/homelessness. At the time of writing, over 20 individuals had been through the SAIL program in 2021 with another 19 in the LIFE program.

- Debbie Osborn and Heidi Harper are St. Andrew's coordinators for FPM and continue to attend FPM coordinator meetings every other month, via Zoom.
- The annual "Keeping the Promise" gala was held as a virtual event on December 4, with a live and silent auction including raffle tickets and music.
- Our outreach budget gave \$2,800 this year to Family Promise Metrowest, plus \$15,000 from the capital campaign. FPM will also benefit from the 2021 Alternative Giving Fair (AGF).
- Salvation Army/Pearl Street Cupboard & Café
   The Pearl Street Cupboard & Café is now operated by the United Way, and we no longer organize parish volunteers to support Pearl Street. However, the outreach budget gave \$3,000 to Salvation Army Framingham.
- 3. Wellesley Food Pantry
  - St. Andrew's outreach continues to support the efforts of the pantry in helping our neighbors who are experiencing food insecurity. The Wellesley Food Pantry received financial support from St. Andrew's in the sum of \$1,500 from the budget and will also benefit from the 2021 AGF.

# Urban/Boston outreach partners and activities

- 1. St. Stephen's Episcopal Church
  St. Stephen's Church in Boston's South End has been our sister parish for a very long time. Through our continued partnership with this inner-city parish, we have been enriched by our relationships with many of the leadership and staff of St. Stephen's.
- Cam McCormick and Karen Pekowitz organized our week of volunteering for the B-SAFE summer enrichment program which occurred July 26 to July 30. We provided over 80 meals a day for on-site campers at St. Stephen's (with appropriate COVID-19 protocols in place) and enjoyed a fun outing to Lake Cochituate on July 30. We also provided bags of non-perishable groceries, which were delivered to support St. Stephen's Youth Programs (SSYP).
- St. Andrew's continued to support the B-LOVE program by providing non-perishable grocer-

- ies and pre-paid Visa cards for distribution to the SSYP. Through August we continued the weekly drop-offs every Tuesday at the home of the Harpers. With the return of in-person services in September the collection was modified. Non-perishables were then dropped off in the St. Andrew's parish hall. The program has been a huge success with many St. Andrew's parishioners donating regularly.
- St. Andrew's support of the B-READY program, which provided hearty macaroni and cheese casseroles for the after-school program at St. Stephen's, was restarted in October, with a team gathering monthly in the St. Andrew's kitchen to prepare the casseroles.
- In November, Herb Manning organized 120
  Thanksgiving food bags that were given to
  St. Stephen's. This was a substantial increase from
  the 80 bags we have traditionally provided, underlining the continued financial hardship and need
  caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. The Mannings
  and several other volunteers shopped for the turkeys and food and were delighted to have the support of the Rite-13 group to organize the bags on
  Sunday, November 21, for delivery to St. Stephen's.
- The Whitings prepared the Christmas baskets given to the seniors at St. Stephen's, including beautifully knitted items provided by the St. Andrew's stitchers and Christmas cookies baked by parishioners.
  - St. Stephen's received financial support from St. Andrew's in the sum of \$16,400 from the budget plus \$15,000 from the capital campaign and will also benefit from the 2021 AGF.
- 2. Healthcare Without Walls
  - Healthcare Without Walls (HCWW), founded by Dr. Roseanna Means, provides free and compassionate medical care and advocacy to homeless women and families. St. Andrew's has supported the efforts of this ministry for many years with leadership provided by Donna Kell.
- During the pandemic shutdown, HCWW was not able to operate from several of their usual spaces as these were closed. This prompted HCWW to realize a long-cherished dream to open their own fully dedicated space. The organization sourced space at 41 West Street, Boston, which is centrally located

- close to many of the shelters used by HCWW clients. The space opened in the fall and is fully functional. A grand opening is planned for Spring 2022.
- "Broadway Smashes COVID", a virtual musical occasion held on February 25 to raise funds for the new clinic, was a smash hit! Many parishioners participated in this fabulous evening featuring well-known Broadway stars. Over \$75,000 was raised.
- The SoxBox. Parishioners donate large white athletic socks (which are needed by homeless people for health reasons) and this is supplemented by an annual grant of \$700 from the outreach budget.
   Donna Kell drops socks off periodically throughout the year.

#### 3. common cathedral

Also known as Ecclesia Ministries, common cathedral is an outreach ministry to underhoused/ homeless people in the Boston area. common cathedral is a weekly worship service held by the Brewer Fountain on Boston Common. For many years St. Andrew's parishioners joined members of the community in worship and provided lunch several times a year. Initially, during the pandemic, we were not able to join the worship service but, led by Cam McCormick, parishioners continued to provide meals once a month in the form of 150 "grab and go" lunches. We were pleased to join in worship once more in the summer and, from September, reverted to participating every two to three months. We provide sustenance in the form of food, but the constancy of this congregation fuels our faith.

#### International partner and activities

#### 1. El Hogar, Honduras

For more than 40 years, El Hogar has been transforming the lives of children who are crippled by extreme poverty by providing access to quality education and technical training. Bianka Eichelberger acts as St. Andrew's liaison to El Hogar.

• During 2021 El Hogar continued to offer their school programs virtually to most students, with just a few at the residential school.

• On October 24, El Hogar hosted "Esperanza, a Celebration of Hope," an annual online fundraising event that provided participants with information and insight into the mission of El Hogar. More than 300 people, including many from St. Andrew's, joined in. Over \$100,000 was raised in total.

St. Andrew's provided \$5,000 in financial support from the budget plus \$15,000 from the capital campaign; El Hogar will also benefit from the 2021 AGF.

#### 2. St. Andrew's Stitchers

Donna Kell organizes the St. Andrew's stitchers who work at home to make beautiful knitted and crocheted goods such as hats, scarves, blankets, cotton washcloths, and baby clothes. These items are distributed to many of our outreach partners including Healthcare Without Walls and common cathedral; they are eagerly anticipated gifts in the Christmas baskets for the elderly of St. Stephen's.

#### 3. Alternative Giving Fair (AGF)

The AGF provides parishioners the opportunity to support our outreach partners by making donations in lieu of actual Christmas gifts. The team provides cards that parishioners can give to their loved ones to inform them of the donation and organization. The AGF organized by Ann Johnson with assistance from Cam McCormick was a hybrid event with an in-person fair on December 12 supplemented by on-line donations.

#### 4. 2021 Outreach Grants

In 2021, grants totaling \$30,000 were distributed to the following organizations. Each grant application was sponsored by a parishioner, noted in parenthesis. Grants were awarded in two waves, in June and November.

#### June 2021

- \$4,800 to the Diamantis Tourette Syndrome Scholarship Family Foundation (Elizabeth Martin), to provide support to college students with Tourette Syndrome.
- \$5,000 to MassBay Community College (Toby Kell), to provide financial aid for food-insecure students.
- \$5,000 to New Life Furniture Bank of MA (Paige Manning), to supply new mattresses to families transitioning from homelessness to housing.

- \$5,000 to Bridge over Troubled Waters (Michaela Osborn), to provide home essentials to teens/ young adults transitioning out of homelessness.
- \$5,000 to update handbook provided by Parents Helping Parents to parents interacting with social services (Paige Manning).

#### November 2021

- \$2,600 to Médecins Sans Frontières for Haiti relief (Joe Jankowski).
- \$2,600 to the New American Immigration Fund at Temple Beth Elohim (Donna Kell) towards the resettlement of an Afghan family in the greater Boston area.

The many and varied opportunities to put our faith into action are what make St. Andrew's such a vibrant and caring community. The year 2021 has been challenging for our outreach ministries, but I am grateful for the generous response of our parish and thank the outreach committee members for their coordination of our efforts: Al Dubé, Zebby Dubé, Bianka Eichelberger, Joanna Horobin, Donna Kell, Peter Lull, Herb Manning, Anne Manners, Cam McCormick, Debbie Osborn, Caren Parker, Madison Riley, Mary Scanlon, Jack Whiting, Jill Whiting, and our warden representative, Paige Manning. We miss Margarethe Kulke who died in 2021, and who for many years masterminded the annual Souper Bowl collection for the Wellesley Food Pantry, among her many other contributions to St. Andrew's.

We continue to strive to put our faith into action and trust in God's unwavering love for our strength and perseverance in the year ahead.

## Report of the Vestryperson for Property

STEMMING FROM ST. ANDREW'S 125th Capital Campaign in 2019, upgrades to the sanctuary, narthex, and children's chapel are completed. This historic set of upgrades was coterminous with the sanctuary's pandemic closure.

The renovations, originally planned for summer 2020, instead began in Fall 2020/Winter 2021, a period when the church was closed to parishioners. A COVID-19 induced change, a positive one, was the

addition of air treating technology, called "bipolar ionization", which mitigates and reduces the spread of viruses. This renovation was completed in 2021.

Again, we are grateful to Steve Killeen for the care and attention he gives to the maintenance of our properties. Our dramatic renovation project rightly stole the limelight, but projects coordinated by Steve, such as routine maintenance, are essential.

## Report of the Vestryperson for Stewardship

THE 2022 STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE came together in the Spring of 2021 to begin planning for the 2022 campaign. Given the resumption of in-person services, the refurbishment of our sanctuary, and the stresses and continuing uncertainty over the COVID-19 pandemic, we decided our power as a community was crucial. The theme of the campaign was "Our Spiritual Home: The Future Together." Our goals were to raise \$1,050,000 and have participation from 300 households.

Our strategy relied on some successful past guides, including beginning the campaign in October and

keeping it to a crisp four-week frame. Due to the new hybrid structure of our services, we had to reimagine or fully rethink other elements of the campaign to work both physically and virtually. These elements included:

- Keeping parts of 2021's successful virtual campaign, such as video testimonies, email updates, a virtual thermometer, and e-Pistle updates
- Kick-off video interview with Adrian Robbins-Cole and Sarah Robbins-Cole to introduce the campaign and theme

- Returning to in-person elements of past campaigns, including in-person testimonies, thermometer updates in the narthex, and committee members available at coffee hour to discuss pledging
- In-person updates from the stewardship committee on progress

As we wind down our campaign, I am pleased to report that we have raised nearly \$1 million and appear to be on track toward our goal of \$1,050,000. We will continue to get gifts and pledges through January.

I would like to thank everyone in the St. Andrew's community who makes a pledge or a gift, as you help us to make the Church and our parish what they are

today. I am grateful to be part of such a wonderful group. I would also like to thank each member of the stewardship committee for their time, talent, and energy in making yet again a very different campaign a success, nonetheless. ## Report of the Vestryperson for Worship

THE WORSHIP COMMITTEE ACTS AS THE LIAISON between the clergy and parishioners of St. Andrew's Church to guide our worship services. The group meets quarterly with the clergy to give support and advice with the planning and coordination of worship details. The committee includes the ministry heads for ushers, acolytes, music, altar guild, flower guild, lay Eucharistic ministers, audio/video team, and the wardens.

2021 was another year affected by extreme caution and care around COVID-19. More than half our year was spent worshipping remotely. From January until June, we continued to join forces with St. Michael's in Holliston. Our online Sunday services were jointly led by Adrian, Margaret, Mia, and Sarah Robbins-Cole. This year, we were able to support a short hiatus for each of the rectors in the winter/spring. Adrian took the lead for our online programming while Sarah took time off from St. Michael's to pursue her studies. Then Sarah joined Margaret and Mia to cover services while Adrian took time to study and recharge. In Adrian's absence, Margaret took on the leadership of the parish and started the process of bringing us back in person with monthly outdoor service options in our lovely rose garden. These outside gatherings gave parishioners the chance to slowly return to worship together—masked, socially distanced, and under shade umbrellas. With the dulcet tones of traffic rolling by, these were very happy affairs that continued into Au-

gust with Adrian's return. On Homecoming Sunday, September 12, we returned to worship in person in our beautifully renovated sanctuary. Although masked and distanced within the pews, it was a glorious time to reconnect, hear our wonderful choir sing and kneel at the rail together. To be able to gather in person to experience the readings and prayers, sermons, and Holy Communion is a true gift that was sorely missed. ## Report of the Vestryperson for Youth Formation

THE YEAR 2021 WAS A TIME OF EXCITEMENT and change in youth formation. COVID-19 continued to keep us on our toes as we balanced our desire for meaningful and engaging educational and community experiences with the reality of masks, social distancing, and contact tracing. We have been blessed to have Rev. Mia Kano guide our youth. Her energy, enthusiasm and wisdom kept us moving forward, planning for the long-term, while also remaining creative and flexible in the near-term. Susan Jackson continued to support the church school and youth programs in her role as Christian learning coordinator. We are incredibly thankful for our passionate and committed church school committee of D.D. Alexander, Megan Burns (ex-officio), Cari Dineen, Heather Schaefer, and Elizabeth Svedlund, who dedicated many hours of their time. Despite the continuing challenges posed by COVID-19, we were able to offer meaningful programming and special events.

We successfully held multiple youth and family events and collaborated with other ministries within St. Andrew's. Early in the year, these events were virtual, but as the weather improved and vaccines became more readily available, we were able to host them outdoors. One event of particular joy was a baby shower for Rev. Mia Kano. It was one of the first large, in-person gatherings at St. Andrew's since the pandemic began, and it was incredibly touching to see our congregation come together around the shared joy of an approaching baby. During the early fall, we took advantage of the warm weather and gathered outside as much as possible. Initial turnout was low, but we were heartened to see increasing participation as the fall continued and more and more families reengaged in parish life. We successfully hosted our first Parent Circle in two years, and planned Cookies and Carols.

Much of spring 2021 was a continuation of the virtual programs we had begun in the fall of 2020. Church school, Rite-13, confirmation class, and youth group continued to meet virtually and get together for occasional in-person, outdoor activities. Rev. Mia Kano and Amanda Kerns found creative ways

to include children and youth in the virtual weekly services, recognizing their importance as members of the congregation.

During the spring, we began to plan for a reopening in the fall of 2021. A significant accomplishment was a curriculum review for the church school program, which includes toddlers through elementary school-aged children. The result of the review was the adoption of two curricula that were implemented in the fall of 2021: a Montessori-based curriculum for our pre-kindergarten and younger elementary-school-aged children, and a hybrid curriculum emphasizing love of self, God, and neighbor for our older elementary school-aged children.

One of the challenges we knew we would face going into the fall was the recruitment and re-engagement of families and teachers. As we began the program year in the fall, we found ourselves once again faced with uncertainty around COVID-19 and specifically the rise of the Delta variant. Our response to both the pandemic and re-engagement of teachers was to hold church school outside in the Montessori school playground and combine all elementary school-aged children. We are very thankful to all who made this possible, especially the clergy who taught our children as we worked to recruit teachers and roll out a new curriculum. By mid-fall, we were able to move our programs inside and had enough volunteer teachers to move our older children into the upstairs classrooms and teach our younger children in the children's chapel.

A detailed report of the specific programming, including changes to our curricula, has been submitted by Rev. Mia Kano.

St. Andrew's youth are an essential part of our parish. We depend upon the many volunteers who teach and mentor our youth and we thank all who give their time to this important ministry.
