

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Staff Reports

Report of the Rector

THIS HAS BEEN A YEAR of transition for St. Andrew's. We have moved from a COVID dominated environment to what we hope is a post pandemic world. The year began very much under the shadow of the pandemic with the in-person attendance

of our Christmas services having been crushed by a COVID variant outbreak over the holiday period. But by Easter, we were able to re-introduce the sharing of bread and wine at communion. In-person attendance at Easter was lower than in pre-pandemic times, but the numbers were far better than they had been at Christmas. We entered the summer with the sense that we seemed to be moving out from under the shadow of the pandemic. But there was a great deal of uncertainty about whether we would begin to see more people return to in-person church at the beginning of the new program year in September 2022. Or would the "new normal" be much lower levels of attendance even in a post COVID world as people's habits and priorities changed after more than two years of pandemic?

It is, therefore, with a sense of gratitude and joy, that we have witnessed increasingly strong in-person attendance since September. When we add the numbers of people following our services online with those who have been attending in person, we have combined attendance comparable to pre-pandemic levels. It has also been very hopeful to see many new families, especially younger families with children, join St. Andrew's since September. This has re-emphasized the importance of our church school programs in drawing new people to the St. Andrew's parish family.

In the first half of the year, we were very concerned about a drop off in volunteers helping to run the various church ministries. This was affecting all the ministries of the church that are featured in this report. Like all churches, St. Andrew's is completely reliant on the gifts of time and talent given so generously by parish-

ioners to maintain the robustness of its parish life. It was therefore very worrying that heads of ministries were reporting that they were having trouble finding volunteers as concerns about COVID persisted and people's habits had changed. But since September we have seen this situation largely reversed. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all our ministry leaders and all our volunteers who give so generously to help make our parish thrive.

Now some might argue that I am focusing too much on attendance numbers. Some clergy would say that it more important to focus on whether you are helping people to grow in the depth and commitment of their Christian faith than on the number of people attending church services. But I think it is not an either/or issue. I believe the fact that people are choosing to return to church and recommitting to being part of the St. Andrew's church family indicates that they value the spiritual life that we offer to them through the many ministries of this parish to which this report is a testimony.

Furthermore, the deepening the spiritual life of the parish, our raison d'être, has very much been at the forefront of our thinking, as we undertook the RenewalWorks spirituality initiative at the beginning of the program year. We had intended to undertake this initiative in 2020 but had to postpone its launch due to the pandemic. But it has felt even more timely to undertake this initiative of spiritual renewal this year as we regather and recommit ourselves to our faith in this post pandemic period. RenewalWorks is about helping parishioners recognize that they are on a spiritual journey of hopefully growing into a deeper faith in Christ. By spirituality, we mean developing a loving relationship with God, with our neighbor, with the world, and with ourselves as Christ taught us. This is what the mission and purpose of our church is about. The RenewalWorks Initiative involves parishioners anonymously taking a survey of their personal faith and beliefs. The results of this survey allow the church to direct its ministries and programs to address the reality of the congregation's spiritual

growing edges. A task force of parishioners is reviewing the data from the survey and will be making recommendations for our ministries at the annual meeting in 2023.

Before ending, I would like to thank all the clergy and staff at St. Andrew's who have worked so hard to help keep our parish alive and well during these uncertain times. There were bittersweet emotions with the departure of the Rev. Mia Kano, the assistant rector for youth and family, to be the priest in charge of a parish in the Diocese of Western Massachusettswe were sad to see her go but excited for her new ministry. The timing of Mia's departure meant that we missed the hiring window for newly ordained clergy and so we were very lucky that the Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole was able to join us as the part time interim associate rector for youth and family, and is now a full-time associate rector. We were also sad to see Amanda Kern leave St. Andrew's after many years as our director of children's music and arts programming. But it has been a blessing to welcome Ciara Cheli as our new youth music director. I would also like to extend a thanks to Wardie Mannix for

her much-loved ministry, Katharine Clark who has so ably managed our office and technology, Susan Jackson for her work with the children, Steve Killeen and Bill Clover for overseeing our church building, and Joanne Butler for handling the church accounts. I would very much like to thank my clergy colleagues, Rev. Margaret Schwarzer and Rev. Karen Vickers Budney, for their outstanding ministry as priests in this parish.

Finally, I would like to thank our vestry and our two church wardens, Will Nystrom and Megan Burns, for their work during this challenging time. I especially want to thank our wardens for a critical role in helping to lead the parish amid all the difficulties that the pandemic has thrown at us. St. Andrew's has been very blessed by their wisdom, insight, and dedication during this time of uncertainty and challenge.

Report of the Associate Rector for Adult Formation and Membership

THE YEAR 2022 HAS BEEN full of resilience and renewal. We find ourselves maintaining an "in person" and "online" world, but more and more people are returning to church in person, and we have had a record number of newcomer families join-

ing us and expanding our community. Both the adult formation committee and the membership committee have engaged a few new strategies to stay connected with our parishioners, but we have also returned to most of the program structures of 2019. I continue to be thankful for the opportunity to worship and work with our St. Andrew's community as we deepen our faith and share the love of Christ with our neighbors in this year of expansion and recovery.

Adult Formation Advisory Committee

Our adult formation committee and I share in the mission of Christian education for adults at St. Andrew's. Your feedback and interests guide the topics and programs we choose, so please share your interests and questions with me or a member of our committee. I am thankful for the service and creativity of our members who served in 2022: Pam Alexander, Peter Fergusson (rest in peace), David Guydan, Carrie Hawley, Ansley Martin, Will Nystrom, Cynthia Scott, Carol Shedd, Paul Shellito, and Sandy Warren. I'm especially thankful for the strong leadership of our stalwart chair, Ansley Martin. He is an effective administrator who is dedicated to building up opportunities for adult learning and Christian formation. He also runs a mean Turkey Trot.

Adult Formation and Learning

This year, adult formation has continued to be hybrid, offering our Bible circles, Men's Bible study, and 9am Christian learning online, in person, or hybrid mode. Monthly Bible circles and Adrian's monthly Men's Bible study have had an average of 25 parishioners studying scripture. In Advent, Adrian's "Luke Bible Study" drew parishioners to daily reflections and engagement on Realm or Facebook. In 2022, our Bible circle studied the Acts of the Apostles and the challenges of the early church. Men's Bible study studied Mark.

Our 9am Christian learning series, meeting approximately 28 times per year, has averaged 24 members per class, and we have had over 55 people attending at least one Christian learning series class this past year. We paid special attention to how faith and science engage each other this year, a focus of study across the global Anglican communion.

We held our Lenten program in person and online this past year. We couldn't offer the "potluck" part of our "Lenten Potluck & Program" because of COVID protocols. Our evening Lenten programs were smaller than usual; we hope to return to more robust fellowship in 2023.

This year, our Holy Monday Taizé-style service was held in person and broadcast, with over 100 participants, and our Advent service was held in the sanctuary and broadcast live with 35 in person and over 60 people online. I want to offer particular thanks to the members of our Advent Taizé-style meditative working group: D.D. Alexander, Laura Brown MacKinnon, Liz Parsons, Jenny Sawyer, Cynthia Scott, and Carol Shedd.

Our 2022 Blue Christmas service continued to offer space and support for people who are facing significant loss or challenges during the Christmas season.

We were not able to offer "Ashes-To-Go" in 2022 because of the pandemic restrictions. It was a true pleasure to serve as the facilitator and editor for the sixth Lenten Meditation Guide written by St. Andrew's parishioners. In 2022, we printed over 560 copies, mailing a copy to every household on our active parishioner list and sending a daily email to 126 people who asked to get emails of the guide online.

In November, the Wellesley Turkey Trot was in person this year; we had approximately 45 members

of St. Andrew's participating in person. We won the "Biggest Team" award this year! After a three-year pause, St. Andrew's staffed a water table for the race.

We did not host an event with Temple Beth Elohim in 2022, but after a three-year lull, we returned to St. Andrew's field trips. Twenty of us went to the Museum of Russian Icons in Clinton, MA.

Faith & Practice classes, offered as forums for parishioners to share and reflect upon the practice of our daily faith, continue to be vital and engaging. Four classes were held in person this year.

We are also in the midst of planning a pilgrimage to England this summer, another sign that this year is about renewal and recovery. Please turn to our adult formation committee report for more details about our offerings this year.

Membership Committee

It has been a pleasure to work with our membership committee in 2022, and we've worked hard, welcoming over 38 new families as they explored our community and got to know our church.

As we began to return to a more normal daily life, many families have joined us as seekers or newcomers this year, and many of these families have brought young children into the church. We continue to welcome seekers and help integrate newcomers into our parish. We hosted our Kids' Place coffee this fall outside in the playground. We couldn't hold a Newcomer's Brunch just yet but welcomed newcomers at a special coffee hour. We continue to greet people at the start of each Sunday service, and to speak with newcomers and seekers after each service, insuring their welcome. Our membership committee gives each newly baptized child a beautiful picture book celebrating their baptism at St. Andrew's. Please join us in welcoming all the newcomers in our midst. If you see someone standing alone at coffee hour, please introduce yourself and help them to feel welcome. Please turn to our membership committee report for more details about our work this year.

I enjoy being the clergy liaison for the vital work of our membership committee. My main responsibilities lie in welcoming newcomers by email or phone so that they have an immediate clergy welcome. I also meet with newcomers who would like to discuss their faith and help newcomers learn more about our parish. I'm especially thankful for Elizabeth Clarke, chair of our committee. She is a creative driving force in our church's important ministry of welcome. It is a joy to work with her and our faithful membership committee.

Wellesley College Ministry

In 2022, Wellesley College students have continued to worship at our 8am, 10am, and 5pm services, and some join us online. One student also wrote for our Lenten Meditation Guide this year. Unfortunately, due to the pandemic, I have not met students from the class of 2024 or 2025. We have four students from the class of 2026 worshipping with us. Our Wellesley College ministry still benefits from a diocesan grant we secured through the Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole. I reach out to our students with a weekly newsletter, and we encourage students to join us for coffee hours and

special events. Our ministry with Wellesley College students continues to bring energy and enthusiasm into our congregation's life. I hope to build up this ministry in the new year.

Like all of us, I'm thankful for a year that has held some renewal and resilience for our church fellowship and ministry. We can feel the vitality growing in our sanctuary on Sunday mornings. I'm prayerful that our lives will continue to move towards more normal times as we continue "St. Andrew's Strong" in our worship, learning, and fellowship.

Report of the Associate Rector for Youth and Family

THE START of this church school year has been incredibly encouraging and it appears that we are finally emerging from the pandemic with in-person learning. The year started with fully staffed volunteer classroom teachers, a replete church school

committee, and a new youth music director, Ciara Cheli. Mia Kano left a meticulous scheme of work and lesson plans scheduled for the entire year.

First, I want to thank our church school teachers, D.D. Alexander, Matthew Benfer, Bianka Eichelberger, Lee Eichelberger, Heidi Emerson, Caleb Farny, Pamela Grossetti, Hunter MacArthur, Tommy MacArthur, Lakey MacArthur, Ntonhle Kekana, Steve Mahoney, Ellen Staelin, Elizabeth Svedland, Carolyn Urban, Coryell Urban, and Anna Lee Wahls. Thank you, too, to our youth group leaders Rob Brandt and Marie Dunnell.

Our lower school is in its second year of using Godly Play. This is a Montessori-style approach that teaches children the building blocks of faith through Bible lessons being told in story fashion alongside guiding questions to help the children engage their imagination. We have been particularly blessed by not only great teachers but also teens taking an active role in the classroom as well.

Our upper school is also in its second year of using curriculum that combines the principles of Love First and Children's Illustrated Ministry. Each lesson combines prayer, Bible lessons, reflection, and acts of service. We have had many guests from our congregation visit the classroom to talk about the various ministries they are involved in and how these ministries relate to faith and service.

Rite-13 continues to use the national Episcopal curriculum and our parent volunteers have used their own creativity in bringing these lessons to life. Along with being learners, Rite-13ers have started to take on a variety of roles including teaching younger children in our church school and reading lessons during our church services. Many thanks to our outgoing leaders, Judy Marth and Greg Urban. Many thanks also to our current team of leaders, including Lee Eichelberger,

Heidi Emerson, Caleb Farny, and Elizabeth Svedlund, all of whom are doing a phenomenal job.

Moving on to older children, there are ten teens in our in-person confirmation classes. Unlike previous years, we have moved away from the Confirm not Conform curriculum and have engaged the candidates in our lesson planning. What we have learned from them is that they enjoy a balance of getting-to-know-you activities, as well as lessons that include the three-legged stool of Anglicanism—scripture, tradition, and reason/experience.

Our acolyte team has worked hard at making the services special, with the expert guidance of our acolyte leader, Wendy Barry. Thank you, Cameron Cowperthwaite, Alex Dehn, Ben Dehn, Charlie Denomme, Conor Donahue, Clara Eikeboom, Johannes Eikeboom, Benjamin Mahoney, Peter Mahoney, Caroline Martin, Rebecca Martin, and Eloise Svedland.

I am grateful to Rob Brandt, Marie Dunnell, and Adrian Robbins-Cole who have been jump-starting our youth group. We had a successful evening of college care package assembling and Little Angels' Gift Shop gift wrapping. We ended the year with a Christmas party and gingerbread house making.

In addition to these regular activities and classes, this autumn, the church school combined classes for three lessons. The first was a service project to make autumn themed cards to send out to shut-ins and other members of our congregation. The second was to learn about Wily Scholars and the college care

packages project. The children then wrote cards to the recipients of the packages. In December they made Christmas cards and advent wreaths with electric LED candles so that they could be used in assisted living facilities.

Thank you to our church school committee for organizing our fellowship events and children's activities at the homecoming parish picnic, the All Hallows' Eve, and Cookies & Carols. Thank you to Coryell Urban who is the chair and vestry liaison for the church school committee. She brings a wealth of knowledge, insight, and energy to our committee. And finally, thank you to Susan Jackson, the Christian learning coordinator, who organizes the teaching schedule and prepares the classrooms, and so much more. Without her, I would have been lost this year. She has helped me understand the ins and outs of the curricula, conventions, and church year calendar. She is also a wonderful colleague and is a delight to work with.

One last gratitude—I am delighted to be staying on in this role and starting at St. Andrew's as the associate rector of youth and family on a full-time basis. It is truly a delight to work here with such an exceptional staff and warm, wonderful, and energetic congregation. Thank you!

Report of the Music Minister

IN JUNE OF 2022, I completed my 15th year as music minister at St. Andrew's.

Our 2022 music program began the year with a suspension of Thursday evening choir rehearsals due to a spike in COVID. We resumed Thursday

evening rehearsals in February. On Sunday, March 6, 2022, masks in church became optional. Some of our choir members continued to wear masks and some chose not to wear them. We did not sing a Lenten Evensong this year, but we did sing our usual services for Holy Week and Easter. Our section leaders remained constant, but I hired, on an "as needed basis" two additional basses, who are presently studying at Boston University: Gabriel Harrison and William Smalley.

Our congregational choir numbers have grown. We've added two high school students and an eighth grader. Some more congregational members joined the choir at the beginning of January 2023. The choir numbers somewhere around 28 singers.

After 14 years on the job, Amanda Kern, our director of children's music and arts programming left us in June to pursue other opportunities. We've hired Ciara Cheli, who not only has a beautiful soprano voice and sings regularly with the senior choir, but who is also skilled in working with children. We've changed the job description to three, six-week projects: a Sunday musical production at the end of March, a Youth Sunday in May, and the Christmas Pageant in December. We are hoping to attract more children if we do it in this way.

We celebrated All Saints' Day on Sunday, November 6 and St. Andrew's Day on Sunday, November 20, with Iain Massie playing the pipes and 27 singers in the senior choir. Kana Yamoto from Wellesley College accompanied the choir on the piano in Copland's "Zion's Walls." On December 4, we held our Advent Lessons & Carols service with a choir of 31 singers and Thomas Handel playing the organ. This was the first time since 2019 that we were back full strength.

The children's Christmas Pageant was held on Sunday, December 18, 2022, and we had three services on Christmas Eve: 3pm; 5pm, with only a quartet singing; and 10pm, with the senior choir and a string quartet.

We continue to have Wellesley College chamber music ensembles under the direction of Jenny Tang play for preludes and postludes in various services. I want to foster this relationship with Wellesley College.

Jonathan Ambrosino continues to take care of our Juget-Sinclair organ. Denis Juget and Stephen Sinclair came down from Montreal to service the organ the week before Thanksgiving. Due to an emergency back home they left after only two days of work. They plan to return to finish the work early this year. Anthony McKenna tunes our pianos.

As I SIT DOWN TO WRITE THIS LETTER on Gaudete Sunday, it's currently snowing outside and I'm reminded of a quote about snow: "If you choose not to find joy in the snow, you will have less joy in your life but still the same amount of snow." Right now, I'm choosing to be joyful about the snow as I'm choosing to be joyful about the task of writing this letter. What a gift it is for us as wardens to be able to reflect on the triumphs and challenges of this past year at St. Andrew's. In my first year as junior warden, I've had the opportunity to see all the wonderful works that our clergy, staff, and volunteers do for our parish and our community. It's been a real education for me and a true blessing to bear witness to the countless accomplishments of our church.

As 2022 draws to a close, we have been delighted to move closer and closer to a more "normal" year in our parish life. We have learned so much from the resiliency and creativity of our parishioners and are constantly reevaluating our offerings and how to keep some of the many innovations that came out of the pandemic while also returning to more in-person events and services. We continue to run hybrid services on Sundays and have been delighted to see both robust in-person attendance, as well as continued online participation.

The biggest transition this year was the departure of our assistant rector for youth and families, Mia Kano, who was called to serve at St. Mark's Church in East Longmeadow. It is difficult to enumerate Mia's many contributions to St. Andrew's, particularly during the pandemic. Although her talents had been

shared across all age groups here at St. Andrew's, her ministry with the children and youth of our parish were remarkable. Along with our wonderful church school committee, Mia kept church school and youth programming thriving throughout the pandemic, coming up with creative ways to keep the children engaged during a time of great loss and disconnection.

Although we were saddened to see Mia go, her departure created an opportunity to revisit the important ministry of our youth programs with Sarah Robbins-Cole, who ably took on the role of associate rector for youth and families, first in a part-time role and now as a full-time, permanent addition to our clergy. Sarah brings considerable experience of working with youth and young people from her six years as a school chaplain at King's College School Wimbledon in London. Sarah has also worked with collegeaged youth in her role as college chaplain at Wellesley College. We were absolutely delighted to welcome Sarah to the full-time role, and we look forward to her leadership and wisdom.

Throughout all the changes of the past few years, we have been blessed to have had Adrian's steady, thoughtful leadership. Most importantly, Adrian was finally able to begin the RenewalWorks project that had been postponed during the pandemic. A group of vestry members and a dedicated RenewalWorks working group were lucky enough to meet with Rev. Jay Sidebotham in September to learn more about the initiative. As a congregation, we exceeded the participation goals set for us by RenewalWorks and are continuing to review the findings. Although the final report has not been published yet, Adrian has already been implementing some of the suggestions gleaned from the survey, including the current Advent Bible challenge that's been such a welcome part of my own Advent practice this year.

Having spent last summer as our lead clergyperson while Adrian was on sabbatical and Mia was out on maternity leave, Margaret finally had a chance

to enjoy a sabbatical of her own. Margaret's time away was spent traveling on a variety of trips long postponed due to the pandemic, including returning to both the Yale Divinity School and the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C. where she was ordained. Margaret also traveled to the U.K. and spent time reading the works of Thomas Merton, a Roman Catholic monk, among others.

As always, our staff continues to do phenomenal work supporting our clergy and our parish. Along with Holly Anza, our vestryperson for communications, Katharine Clark has been instrumental in the rollout of our new parish directory program, Realm. In addition to all her other myriad duties, Kate has been venturing out to North Hill on a monthly basis to work with our parishioners on getting signed up for the app. Joanne Butler has continued to keep our finances in order and works closely with our finance team and our treasurer to ensure our systems are up to date. Susan Jackson has been a font of institutional knowledge as Sarah Robbins-Cole has taken on the new role of associate rector and helped continue to run the amazing church school program. Sadly, we saw the departure of longtime director of children's music and arts programming Amanda Kern. Amanda worked at St. Andrew's for 14 years and enriched the life of our parish with her children's music ministry. After careful consideration, we decided to somewhat change the role and were delighted to find a new leader to take on this ministry. Ciara Cheli joined St. Andrew's team as youth music director in the fall and is working on staging multiple productions throughout the year, beginning with the Christmas Pageant. She is a 2020 graduate of Wellesley College and has sung with our senior choir on many occasions during her time at the college.

It's been a joy to return more fully to in-person worship to celebrate the Eucharist with Adrian, Sarah, Margaret, and Karen Budney, but also with our fellow parishioners. Coming back to church is meaningful for me, particularly since it gives me a chance to enjoy the wonderful music put together by Wardie Mannix and our amazing choir. Ensuring that our physical home on Denton Road was ready to receive large numbers again is the responsibility of our able sexton,

Steve Killeen, who also managed the transition of the apartment that was vacated with Mia's departure.

This year saw a return to some of our favorite parish traditions, including a reimagined Bargain Haul, which was successfully celebrated in the spring. Our membership and fellowship teams put together some amazing events throughout the year to help bring us all together again in person.

Our annual stewardship drive to fund 2022 provided a firm financial foundation for the work of the parish in the past year as we exceeded our pledge target reaching \$1,125,000 in gifts and pledges. Thanks to all for your continued support and faith in our parish and our missions! Our current campaign for 2023, "Renewing our Faith and Commitment," is approaching our goal. Many thanks to all who have already pledged, and we strongly encourage others to join in—it's never too late to join the cheerful givers!

Serving as the junior warden throughout this past year has been both a blessing and a wonderful challenge for me. I have been ably helped by both clergy and staff, but particularly by my senior warden, Will Nystrom, who has shown me the ropes. I've also learned so much from our entire vestry and I want to offer a particular thanks to those vestrypersons who are departing at the end of this year: Hugh MacArthur, Steve Mahoney, Ansley Martin, and Coryell Urban. Their impact on our congregation will be felt throughout the coming year.

One of the takeaways from our RenewalWorks program that I've tried to incorporate this year is to include more prayer in my daily life. With that in mind, I'd like to leave you all with a favorite prayer of mine from T.J. Mooney that I think is helpful in this time of transition between years:

Thou from whom we come, and to whom we go, and by whose will the time between coming and going is time to find ourselves and time to find thee, we offer thee thanks for this time of change, for new knowledge and new friendships, new perspectives on our lives. Help us to remember. Help us to become. Help us to be of use. For the kingdom, the power and the glory are thine, now and forever. Amen.

Montessori School Report

THE WELLESLEY MONTESSORI SCHOOL is delighted to continue its long-standing relationship with St. Andrew's. We are grateful for the continued support of St. Andrew's, which has allowed us to continue to offer our community a high-quality program for children 15 months to six years old for almost five decades. Access to a community-based program is more important now than ever, as families look for a safe and nurturing place for their child's development to be fostered. Vestry Committee Reports

Report of the Vestryperson for Adult Formation

IN 2022 WE CONTINUED THE STRONG WORK established by our dedicated adult formation and christian learning committee and Rev. Margaret Schwarzer. It has never ceased to amaze me, having served on this committee for close to seven years, the extent of insightful and thoughtful discernment and collaboration about formulating and implementing the programming for our parish. Our aim continues to be to search for topics and themes to enrich and engage our Christian spirituality, to build and reinforce hope and faith, and to enlighten and educate through the wisdom of the Episcopal Church.

Our Christian learning sessions and the evening Lenten Program are firmly settled in a hybrid setting of in-person and online participation. This enables parishioners the flexibility they desire to participate in a program. To expand access to our programming, this fall we extended babysitting hours, in coordination with church school, so families with young children can attend. We will continue to provide this service in 2023. Our Advent Taizé-style service and the Holy Monday Taizé service are both held in-person as well as broadcasted for others to view and experience. The Blue Christmas service and our Faith & Practice sessions remain in-person events only to maintain the intimacy and soulfulness of each experience. We look forward having the potluck dinner at our Lenten Evening Programs once again in 2023.

As a committee, we try to anticipate the needs and interests of our parish. Because there was a sense of mental, emotional, and physical toll caused by the pandemic and other global stressors, we chose themes such as "Choosing Gratitude and Sharing What We Have", "Choosing Spiritual Strength", and meditatively experiencing "Christmas Spirituality". We enjoyed two sessions discussing the powerful practice of gratitude or how we can be resilient through hope, wonder and gratitude. We were enlightened to the Refugee Resettlement ministry at Temple Beth Elohim by speaker Deb Gotbetter. With a focus on outreach, we had a presentation regarding El Hogar by Execu-

tive Director Denise Vargas and another on B-SAFE by Liz Steinhauser. Our Faith & Practice offerings included topics such as "What does GOD think of Suicide? What do you think?", "Claiming Joy as a Spiritual Practice", and "Singing the Pslams".

A topic we spent a tremendous amount of time on throughout the year was God/Religion and Science. Our exploration, discernment, and inspiration came from sources such as: "Science Increasingly Makes the Case for God," a Wall Street Journal article; Science and God are Both "True": A Look at How Anglicanism Shaped the Scientific Revolution of the 17th Century; the New Anglican Communion Science Commission; the book The Language of God: A Scientist Presents Evidence for Belief, by Francis Collins; A Scientific and Theological View of Light; as well as The Anglican Church's Science & Faith Project.

During Lent, our 9am Christian learning sessions explored the visual images of *Hell in the West*. We also delved into the book *The Gifts of the Jews: How a Tribe* of Desert Nomads Changed the Way Everyone Thinks and Feels by Thomas Cahill. As for our Wednesday evening Lenten Program, our theme was "Living a Life of Faith, Hope, and Love." Topics included reflections on the books The Book of Hope by Jane Goodall and Pillars of Joy: Lasting Happiness in a Changing World by Archbishop Desmond Tutu, His Holiness the Dalai Lama, and Douglass Abrams. Rabbi Rachel Saphire of Temple Beth Elohim presented a session on "Faith and Love from a Jewish Perspective" while Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole offered us the "Three R's for Living a Life of Faith, Hope and Love: Ruts, Routines, and Rituals for Holding onto Faith in Times Like These". Our other offering was a "Visio Divina: A Visual Mediation Based on Faith, Hope, and Love (1 Corinthians 13)" led by Helen Netos of Bethany House of Prayer.

Prayer is the cornerstone of our spirituality and faith. As such, we devoted time to understanding and experiencing ancient prayer practices such as centering prayer, praying the Psalms, and praying with icons. In additions, Rev. Dr. Jim Weiss, Associate

Professor, Boston College provided two sessions on the history of our prayer book titled: "Anglican Worship: Prayer Book 1549-1979."

Whether it was the Christian learning series, Bible Circle, or the Men's Bible/book clubs, interest and attendance reflected pre-pandemic levels and grew in some areas. We were thrilled that our St. Andrew's Turkey Trot Team was able to participate in person and share in fellowship and support for a great cause. We were thrilled to win "the largest team" award.

Unfortunately, we're not able to bring back events such as the college coffee meetings or the Wellesley College retreats/workshops/programming. We hope to do so in 2023. However, we were able to have our first field trip in three years to the Russian Icon Museum in Canton, MA. In addition, planning and coordination for a pilgrimage to England in July 2023 was completed.

We are extremely fortunate at St. Andrew's to have the resources to be able to invite outside speakers to share their knowledge and wisdom with us. However, we are also blessed to have a treasure trove of talent and thoughtfulness from our clergy and parishioners who share with us as well. We wish to acknowledge our gratitude to parishioners D.D. Alexander, Carrie Hawley, Joanna Horobin, and Karen Pekowitz for their presentations. As always, we are thankful for the contributions from our clergy, Adrian Robbins-Cole, Sarah-Robbins-Cole, Karen Budney, Mia Kano, and Margaret Schwarzer. Not to be overlooked, we acknowledge and thank all those who have contributed a Lenten reflection in our Lenten Mediation Guide over the years. Together we learn and grow our spirituality and faith.

Report of the Vestryperson for Communication

Realm

A primary focus of the communications committee in 2022 was the transition from our old database to Realm. So far, we have updated active members' contact information, helped with email signups and logins, started organizing ministry groups, and used the site for registering children for church school, including Kids' Place, Godly Play, upper school, Rite-13, youth group, and acolytes, with the help of Susan Jackson, Sarah Robbins-Cole, and Coryell Urban. We have begun to add photos to parishioners' profiles, in hopes that we can soon print photo directories for members who still prefer printed materials.

We have also started using the "News" feature of Realm as an internal social-media-esque sharing site. We plan to continue to add the number of features on Realm that we use regularly, including the app, which allows parishioners to send instant messages to parishioners, groups, and clergy. It also allows us to push communications out to parishioners, and it allows for ministry groups to communicate on shared threads.

Social media

We have increased the weekly number of Instagram posts, which themselves link to Facebook, which in turn, has increased the number of followers. We have been focusing on church happenings, including outreach projects, upcoming events, upcoming sermon "sneak peaks," and family and children's events. We continue to post photo albums of events on the church's Facebook page, thanks to our church photographer, Peter Lull. We continue to check in with the diocese to align our social media guidelines.

Streaming services

We have continued to stream our Sunday services on Facebook, the website, and YouTube. We have committed online parishioners tuning in every week from around the country and even some from across the globe. A special thanks to Rob Brandt for his continued commitment to helping St. Andrew's stream, even post-pandemic.

Report of the Vestryperson for Human Resources

THE HR COMMITTEE ADVISES the rector and wardens on matters concerning paid staff of the church. The committee prepares and maintains job descriptions and an employee handbook, recommends salary levels and adjustments, investigates benefit options, and assists in the hiring of staff members. Over the last several months, the focus of HR has been on the search for an associate rector for youth and family. To that end, we have explored externally to evaluate the supply of potential candidates, as well as internally by collecting input from the various constituencies who interact with the individual filling this role. We are thrilled that this research has resulted in the permanent hire of Sarah Robbins-Cole, who has been serving as interim in this role since last spring.

The Letter of Paul to the Ephesians proclaims: *There* is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all. (Ephesians 4:4-6)

In addition to serving as a spiritual home to our congregation, St. Andrew's is also a workplace where dedicated clergy and staff endeavor together to fulfill their professional calling.

The HR committee strives to support the rector, as "CEO" of St. Andrew's operations, in providing a

healthy and enriching environment for everyone who reports for duty each day, as one body, one spirit.

With a goal to sustain and grow our congregation, HR looks forward to working with the rector on creating an organizational infrastructure which allows for programming to attract new members of all ages, but most particularly families with children.

Anyone attending a worship service at St. Andrew's this past fall would witness that we have withstood the challenges posed by the pandemic and come out on the other side. This would not have been the case without much effort and sacrifice by our amazing clergy and staff, and most of all, by the grace of God.

The First Letter of Peter teaches us: And after you have suffered for a little while, the God of all grace, who has called you to his eternal glory in Christ, will himself restore, support, strengthen, and establish you. (I Peter 5:10)

This past year has seen a gradual return to something closer to normalcy at St. Andrew's. We are blessed to have been in the capable hands of our rector, Rev. Adrian Robbins-Cole, who has not only gracefully steered us through the worst of the pandemic, he has also reinvigorated the congregation with many new initiatives, most exciting of which is the Renewal-Works program. Adrian has already started implementing some of the ideas generated by the Renewal-

Works survey data gathered from the congregation, including the virtual Advent Bible Challenge.

Associate rector Rev. Margaret Schwarzer has continued to stimulate us spiritually and intellectually with adult formation programs. Recent highlights include conversations around, "Science & Religion," with discussions based on readings from Francis Collins' book, *The Language of God* as well as conversations about "Different Perspectives of the Same Cosmos," which offered both scientific and theological views of Light. A field trip to the Museum of Russian Icons resonated with artistic sensibilities and complemented the "Icon of the Week" practice instituted in our church transept. Margaret's preaching helped us weather the storm of COVID throughout 2022. Her pastoral care, particularly the Blue Christmas service, reminds us that we do not walk alone in our challenges.

St. Andrew's has also been fortunate to have Sarah Robbins-Cole take on the role of assistant rector for youth and family, first in a part-time interim capacity, and now as a full-time permanent role. Sarah brings her many talents as a clergy person to both the pulpit and the classroom and has worked with younger members of our congregation and their parents with perseverance, grace, and wisdom. By all accounts, Sarah has done a masterful job of managing programming, alongside both staff and parish volunteers. While COVID restrictions had limited the ability to draw the children and youth of our parish to activities over the last year, we are excited by the prospect of Sarah re-engaging them and building programs to attract older teens as well.

Pastoral associate Rev. Karen Vickers Budney generously shares her time and talent with St. Andrew's by her deep pastoral care ministry and we are truly grateful for her service to our congregation.

Last spring, we bade farewell to Rev. Mia Kano, whose ministry we were especially grateful for during

the difficult times of the pandemic. Her priestly and technological skills were crucial in helping the parish establish online ministries when in-person gatherings were not feasible.

As parish administrator, Katharine Clark plays a key role in overseeing the life of the parish, including our technology and communications, bulletins and publications, and managing the complexities of the church calendar. Katharine proactively seeks out ways for technology to enhance the ability of the parish to communicate and make connections with new and existing parishioners, such as with the recently established Realm platform.

St. Andrew's is truly blessed by the brilliance of music minister, Helen "Wardie" Mannix. The music program is one of the most beloved and appreciated elements in the life of our parish and Wardie's masterful conducting of the choir elevates the spiritual enrichment of weekly worship services.

This fall we welcomed youth music director Ciara Cheli, who brings new enthusiasm and vision to this role. We look forward to the performances she will be directing with our children and youth in the coming year.

Throughout the year, Christian learning coordinator Susan Jackson works very hard behind the scenes to organize the church school ministries. Both Sarah Robbins-Cole and Mia Kano have stressed how vital Susan's work is in ensuring the smooth running of our church school programs, which are critical for engaging new families with St. Andrew's.

Our much-loved sexton, Steve Killeen provides for the maintenance and care of our church buildings. He is incredibly reliable and works tirelessly to support both staff and lay people when they are managing events in the building.

Report of the Vestryperson for Outreach

THE PRIMARY OBJECTIVE of the St. Andrew's outreach ministry is to help our congregation put our Christian faith into action. In 2022 the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic, and especially the rise in cost of living, continued to adversely impact our outreach partners. With COVID restrictions easing we were pleased to resume in-person volunteer activities, inperson meetings of the outreach committee and an inperson outreach partner showcase event during coffee hour on November 13. Highlights of our outreach work for 2022 follow.

Metrowest/Local partners and activities

- 1. Family Promise Metrowest
 Our relationship with Family Promise Metrowest
 (FPM), a cooperative interfaith partnership helping families with housing insecurity through safe transitional shelter, meals, and case management, continues to be a positive opportunity to live our faith.
- In 2022 FPM reached a key milestone with the opening of three self-contained family shelter units at FPM's HQ at Mulligan Street, Natick. Volunteers from St. Andrew's are once again volunteering on site.
- The SAIL (Sustaining Achievements for Independent Living) program continues to prepare families for transition from shelter into permanent housing and continues to support them once placed. The LIFE (Local Initiative for Family Empowerment) program is designed to support families at risk of eviction/homelessness.
- Our outreach budget gave \$2,800 this year to Family Promise Metrowest. FPM also benefits from the 2022 Alternative Giving Fair (AGF).
- 2. *Salvation Army*The outreach budget gave \$3,000 to Salvation Army Framingham.
- 3. Wellesley Food Pantry
 St. Andrew's outreach continues to support the
 efforts of the pantry in helping our neighbors
 who are experiencing food insecurity. The Wellesley Food Pantry received financial support from

St. Andrew's in the sum of \$1,500 from the budget and also benefits from the 2022 AGF.

Urban/Boston partners and activities

- 1. St. Stephen's Episcopal Church
 St. Stephen's Church in Boston's South End is
 our sister parish. In 2022 the leadership of both
 the church and the St. Stephen's Youth Program
 changed as the Rev. Tim Crellin was called to a new
 parish and the Rev. Liz Steinhauser took up a new
 role. We look forward to continuing our partnership with this inner-city parish as we get to know
 the new leadership.
- Cam McCormick and Karen Pekowitz organized our volunteering for the B-SAFE summer enrichment program. We shopped and prepped, and then hosted and provided a generous lunch and snacks for a fun outing to Hopkinton State Park on August 5. We also provided bags of non-perishable groceries for delivery to St. Stephen's Youth Programs (SSYP).
- St. Andrew's parishioners have continued to support the B-LOVE program by donating nonperishable groceries.
- St. Andrew's continues to support the B-READY after-school program by providing hearty snacks, currently "make your own tacos." A team gathers the first Sunday of the month in the St. Andrew's kitchen to prepare the meals.
- In November, parishioners donated over \$4,500 to supply holiday dinners, and gifts for seniors, at St. Stephen's. Herb Manning shopped for the turkeys and food and was delighted by the enthusiastic volunteer corps that helped organize the bags for 100 holiday dinners on Sunday, November 20 and helped with delivery to St. Stephen's. Jack & Jill Whiting prepared Christmas baskets to be given to seniors at St. Stephen's, including beautifully knitted items provided by the St. Andrew's stitchers, and Christmas cookies baked by parishioners.
- During Advent parishioners donated gifts of toys, sporting equipment and clothes requested by St. Stephen's Youth Program families as part of B-SPARKLE.

- St. Stephen's received additional financial support from St. Andrew's in the sum of \$13,000 from the budget and the St. Stephen's Youth Programs also benefits from the 2022 AGF.
- 2. Healthcare Without Walls/Bridges to Moms Healthcare Without Walls (HCWW), founded by Dr. Roseanna Means, provides free and compassionate medical care, and advocacy to homeless women and families. St. Andrew's has supported the efforts of this ministry for many years with leadership provided by Donna Kell. In 2021 the organization opened a fully dedicated space at 41 West Street, Boston which is centrally located close to many of the shelters used by HCWW clients. In 2022 HCWW underwent significant change following the retirement of Dr. Means and the hiring of new leadership. Dr. Means continues to lead the "Bridges to Moms" initiative at the Brigham and Women's Hospital, bringing ante-natal and postnatal medical care to homeless pregnant women and new mothers, and early childhood development oversight to their children. Given the changes at HCWW the nature of the relationship with St. Andrew's is under review. In the meantime, we continue to support the Bridges to Mom's initiative by their inclusion in the 2022 AGF and a "Pampers diaper drive" as part of the Advent Giving Tree.

3. common cathedral

An outreach ministry of Ecclesia Ministries to underhoused/homeless people in the Boston area, common cathedral is a weekly worship service held by Brewer's fountain on Boston Common. Under Cam McCormack's leadership, St. Andrew's parishioners join members of the community in worship and provide lunch several times a year. We provide sustenance in the form of food, but the constancy of this congregation fuels our faith.

4. The Sox Box

Parishioners donate large white athletic socks (which people living on the streets need for health reasons) and this is supplemented by an annual grant of \$700 from the outreach budget. The socks are distributed periodically to homeless shelters, *common cathedral* and HCWW.

5. St. Andrew's stitchers

Donna Kell coordinates the St. Andrew's stitchers who work at home to make beautiful knitted and crocheted goods such as shawls, hats, scarves, blankets, cotton washcloths, and baby clothes. Since this ministry began in 2006 some 15,000 items have been lovingly crafted. The shawls are gifted to parishioners in need by the pastoral team and other items are distributed to many of our outreach partners including the clients of Healthcare Without Walls, Bridges to Mom's "Welcome Home Baby" baskets, members of the common cathedral congregation and are eagerly anticipated items in the Christmas baskets for the elderly of St. Stephen's. Starting in the fall of 2022 the knitters have been busy making sweaters, hats, and blankets for infants and toddlers in Ukraine, to be shipped in January 2023.

International partner and activities

El Hogar, Honduras

For more than 40 years, El Hogar has been transforming the lives of children from vulnerable situations by providing access to quality education and technical training. Bianka Eichelberger acts as St. Andrew's liaison to El Hogar. In 2022 Bianka was elected to the board of El Hogar and visited Honduras.

- During 2022 El Hogar continued to offer their school programs to over 200 children, both those residing with their families in the community as well as at the residential schools.
- St. Andrew's provided \$5,000 in financial support from the budget and El Hogar will also benefit from the 2022 AGF.

Emergency relief/Episcopal relief and development. We provided a grant of \$4,350.

Alternative Giving Fair (AGF)

The AGF provides parishioners the opportunity to support our outreach partners by making donations in lieu of actual Christmas gifts. The team provides cards that parishioners can give to their loved ones to inform them of the donation and organization. The 2022 AGF, organized by Ann Johnson with assistance from Cam McCormick, was extremely successful. At the time of writing this report, in mid-December, more than \$23,000 had been received with more donations expected throughout December.

2022 Outreach Grants

In 2022 grants totaling \$30,000 were distributed to the following organizations. Each grant application was sponsored by a parishioner, noted in parenthesis. In 2022, we were especially pleased to receive an application from the 2022 confirmand class and encourage the class of 2023 to submit a grant in 2023. Grants were awarded in two waves, in spring and fall.

Spring 2022

- \$5,000 to RIP Medical Debt (Class of '22 Confirmands), which was more than matched by the congregation, erasing over a million dollars of medical debt
- \$5,000 to North American Family Institute (NAFI) (Margaret Zusky) to support the creation of a teenperson "youth council" informing the NAFI Youth and Police training initiative
- \$5,000 to ROCA, Springfield (Lisa Howe), to provide trained service providers to intervene with youth experiencing trauma and violence
- \$5,000 to The Wily Network (Joy Denomme), to expand the number of Wily scholars supported by the network, and specifically to support career counselling for graduating scholars

Fall 2022

- \$5,000 to Caritas Communities (Tom Palmer) to support clients moving into accommodation from homelessness
- \$5,000 to the International Institute of New England (Cam McCormack) to support reunification of immigrant children to family members or sponsors

The many and varied opportunities to put our faith into action are what make St. Andrew's such a vibrant and caring community. This past year has been an economically challenging year for our outreach partners but I am grateful for the generous response of our parish and thank the outreach committee members for their coordination of our efforts: Joy Denomme, Al Dubé, Zebby Dubé, Bianka Eichelberger, Jennifer Hanley, Donna Kell, Peter Lull, Anne Manners, Herb Manning, Paige Manning, Cam McCormick, Debbie Osborn, Madison Riley, Mary Scanlon, Jack Whiting, Jill Whiting, Margaret Zusky (communication liaison), Megan Burns (warden representative), and Adrian Robbins-Cole (clergy representative).

We continue to strive to put our faith into action and trust in God's unwavering love for our strength and perseverance in the year ahead.

Report of the Vestryperson for Stewardship

THE 2023 STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE came together in the spring of 2022 to begin planning for the 2023 campaign. Given the parish's participation in the RenewalWorks program this fall, which is predicated upon spiritual growth, and given our desire to continue to invest in our spiritual home, our theme for this year became: "Renewing our Faith and Commitment." Our goals were to raise \$1,100,000 and have participation from 300 households.

Our thinking continued to evolve as we moved out of a complete pandemic mode of operation, but still worked in a world that was hybrid. We adapted successful aspects of the 2022 campaign, but also made some enhancements for 2023:

- Keeping parts of 2022's successful hybrid campaign, such as video testimonies, email updates, and in-person thermometer, and e-Pistle updates
- Expansion of the campaign from four to six Sundays to allow for reaching the broadest possible audience

- Return to written testimonies in the weekly bulletin for those attending church in person
- Publishing an alphabetical list of those supporting the campaign, dubbed "St. Andrew's Cheerful Givers" which appeared online and in the bulletin
- Continuing in-person updates from the stewardship committee on progress

As we wind down our campaign, I am pleased to report that we have raised over \$1.1 million from over 250 pledges as of this writing in early December. We will continue to get gifts and pledges through the winter.

I would like to thank everyone in the St. Andrew's community who makes a pledge or a gift as this helps us to make the church and our parish what they are today. I am grateful to be part of such a wonderful group. I would also like to thank each member of the stewardship committee for their time, talent and energy in making yet again a very different campaign a success, nonetheless. Members are: Connie Barnes, Joe Hamilton, Eliot Heher, Ann Johnson, Allen Jones, Lou Madge, Herb Manning, Will Nystrom, Madison Riley, George Stathis, and Michael Vanin.

Report of the Vestryperson for Worship

QUARTERLY MEETINGS FOR OUR COMMITTEE provide a chance for the leadership of St. Andrew's creative ministries to meet with clergy to plan every service on our busy church calendar: baptisms and funerals, Christmas Eve and Easter, and everything in between. This committee includes the ministry heads for acolytes, altar guild, flower guild, lay Eucharistic minsters and readers, music, ushers, video, and church wardens. Together we explore all our options to elevate the beauty and majesty of our faith inside our sanctuary. Our committee's focus is on how to support the clergy during the service and how to inspire the congregation in all that they see and hear. Each of these separate ministries offer opportunities for any-

one in our congregation to use their creative talents to take an active role in our worship services.

St. Andrew's is blessed with a strong base of volunteers for the many facets of our worship but there is always room for someone new. Those of us who can serve in these ministries enjoy a deep understanding of faith and community. Training is a joyous endeavor offered with aplomb by long-serving members. There is nothing like being in the church before the congregation arrives. Sometimes there is stillness and peace and a chance for a quiet prayer or two. Sometimes there is the wonderful hubbub of activity in preparation and excitement for the gathering of the parish. Each person involved in the ministries listed above gets to experience this.

At the start of 2022, our community slowly returned from another round of COVID-19 over the December holidays. There was a concern among many that attendance would be down or may stay online forever. Our ministry leaders were unsure how many folks would be comfortable renewing their commitment to volunteer. But we remained hopeful. On Sunday, April 3, we were able to communally share in Holy Eucharist (using intinction cups instead of the chalice) for the first time in almost two years. Our attendance numbers slowly rose and with this our volunteers returned.

Our program year in September was led by the new clergy team of the Rev. Adrian Robbins-Cole, the Rev. Margaret Schwarzer, and the Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole. It was exciting to see strong attendance numbers at Homecoming Sunday on September 11, 2022. Our beautiful services and robust community have returned—with the addition of 25 to 50 online parishioners each week. It is wonderful to feel we're back on our feet as a congregation worshipping together.

This past year we saw changes in our clergy and staff. At the end of May, Mia Kano, our assistant priest, announced her departure for a new job as rector at St. Mark's in East Longmeadow. We also lost the talents of Amanda Kern, our director of children's music and arts programming, at the end of the school year. Rev. Margaret Schwarzer was able to take a well-earned sabbatical for June, July, and part of August. In August, our vestry voted to bring on the Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole as an interim associate rector to lead our church school and family outreach until St. Andrew's could find a replacement for Mia. With the start of the school year, our music program added the talents of Ciara Cheli to lead our youth in three special services:

Christmas Pageant, a special musical theatre event, and Youth Sunday. In December, it was announced that Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole would join our clergy team full-time as an associate rector for youth and family.

From the pews, our services are so beautiful and inspiring. I want to celebrate everyone who makes it happen from behind the scenes. It truly takes a village to get us to 10am every Sunday morning. Our worship services depend on the many talents of the following:

- Erica Gelser and her 33 altar guild members for a grand total of 166 joyful servants (at least. . .) and there's always room for more!

Report of the Vestryperson for Youth Formation

YOUTH FORMATION AT ST. ANDREW'S encompasses a wide range of educational and fellowship programs designed to embrace the children and families of our parish as integral members of our congregation and nurture within them a lifelong relationship with God, Jesus Christ, and their community. St. Andrew's offers a broad range of programs for all ages, from infancy through high school. Our curricula are designed to emphasize love and kindness, introduce the foundational stories of Christianity, and empower our children to explore and build confidence in their faith. We offer our children opportunities to lead and participate in outreach ministry and in worship and liturgy. Fellowship events give our families the chance to connect with one another and strengthen our sense of community.

This past year was a year of transition and growth for youth formation. We bid farewell to Rev. Mia Kano at the end of April, and in July, we welcomed Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole as part-time interim associate rector for youth and family. This gave us the opportunity to carefully consider the needs of our youths and families, and we were thrilled to announce in December that Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole would be continuing with us on a permanent, full-time basis. St. Andrew's has and will continue to benefit from Sarah's wisdom and extensive experience as a priest and educator. Susan Jackson continued to support the church school and youth programs in her role as Christian learning coordinator. We are grateful for our passionate and committed church school committee of D.D. Alexander, Pamela Grossetti, Heather Schaefer, Elizabeth Svedlund, and Anna Lee Wahls, who dedicated many hours of their time.

We also experienced transition in our youth music program with the departure of director of children's

music and arts programming, Amanda Kerns, at the end of June, and the hiring of Ciara Cheli. Along with this change came a shift from weekly rehearsals to an exciting new program centered around three events: the Christmas Pageant, a musical theater performance, and Youth Sunday.

Over the course of the year, we have happily seen the number of families participating in our programs and events grow steadily. We were pleased to return to offering childcare for infants and toddlers in the spring, and we have seen a steady increase in children attending church school, including many new families. As the pandemic subsided and young children became eligible for vaccination, we have been able to bring back beloved St. Andrew's traditions, such as Youth Sunday, All Hallow's Eve service and potluck, Little Angels' Gift Shop, and Cookies and Carols. We were also able to successfully collaborate with other ministries within St. Andrew's and with youth rectories in our deanery.

We continued to depend on volunteers to teach our church school classes and lead our youth programs. As the number of children and youths participating in our programs has grown over the past year, so has our need for adult volunteers. We are very grateful to those who have dedicated their time to teaching in 2022 and hope to increase the number of teachers going forward.

A detailed report of the specific programming has been submitted by Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole.

St. Andrew's youth are an essential part of our parish. We are incredibly thankful to the many people who teach, mentor and support our youth, and we thank all who give their time to this important ministry. I look forward to the year ahead!
