

#### First Lesson: Habakkuk 1:1-4; 2:1-4

The oracle that the prophet Habakkuk saw: O Lord, how long shall I cry for help, and you will not listen? Or cry to you "Violence!" and you will not save? 



### **About the Readings**

Habakkuk 1:1-4; 2:1-4 The dates of Habakkuk's ministry and his exact identity are unknown. The book has three parts: a dialogue between the prophet and God (1:2–2:5); a set of woes against the Babylonians (2:6-20); and a poem of trust (3:1-19). The book begins by describing a time when Judah was threatened by enemies from without and by moral and social corruption from within. Habakkuk struggles to understand God's ways and timing. He cries out about God's seeming toleration of injustice and violence. God explains that the Babylonians will be the instrument of God's judgment. Habakkuk then complains that, although Judah was corrupt, Babylon was even more unrighteous. How could a holy God send the wicked to devour God's chosen people? God answers, not in explanation, but in assurance; the time of full vindication will come. Meanwhile, the righteous shall "live by their faith"—not mere theological belief, but faithfulness, steadfastness and absolute trust.

**Psalm 119:137-144** In this reading, taken from the longest psalm in the Bible, the psalmist gives praise to God for God's righteousness and describes the joys and

difficulties that go with keeping God's law.

2 Thessalonians 1:1-4, 11-12 This reading is the first of three from 2 Thessalonians. Paul's stay in Thessalonica (Acts 17:1-10) was relatively brief, and he left the new congregation exposed to the attacks of local Jews and Gentiles. Timothy's encouraging report of their steadfastness in faith led Paul to write 1 Thessalonians (c. AD 51). Presumably, 2 Thessalonians was written a few months later in order to correct a misunderstanding of his teaching on the "day of the Lord" (1 Thessalonians 5:1-2). Paul reminds the Thessalonians of the need to give thanks, even in persecution, for God is increasing their faith and love. The reading then moves into a brief prayer for the community's sanctification through the cooperation of God's initiative in grace and of their human actions. Then Paul begins his further teaching on the return of Christ, which, apparently, some believed had already happened. This echoes Christ's own predictions of how people would use this confidence for personal gain. Paul discourages an alarmist mentality that disrupts the normal activities of life.

Luke 19:1-10 Jericho was a major trade center, and thus also a center for the collection of customs. Zacchaeus risks ridicule and perhaps violence out among the crowds. Jesus makes the decisive gesture of inviting himself to dinner, thus offering Zacchaeus a fellowship denied to him by others. Not in fulfillment of a rule, but in joyous and thankful response, Zacchaeus vows to give half his goods to the poor and to recompense generously those he might have defrauded.

Zacchaeus chooses the most extreme repayment penalty prescribed by the law. In answer both to him and to the murmurers, Jesus points out that even an outcast may receive and respond to "salvation," the presence of the kingdom in the person and message of Jesus. Through his repentance and faith, Zacchaeus becomes a true son of Abraham, walking in the ways of his forefather.


