

Second Lesson: 1 Corinthians 3:1-9

Brothers and sisters, I could not speak to you as spiritual people, but rather as people of the flesh, as infants in Christ. I fed you with milk, not solid food, for you were not ready for solid food. Even now you are still not ready, for you are still of the flesh. For as long as there is jealousy and quarreling among you, are you not of the flesh, and behaving according to human inclinations? For when one says, "I belong to Paul," and another, "I belong to Apollos," are you not merely human?

What then is Apollos? What is Paul? Servants through whom you came to believe, as the Lord assigned to each. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. The one who plants and the one who waters have a common purpose, and each will receive wages according to the labor of each. About the Readings

Deuteronomy 30:15-20 The book of Deuteronomy is presented as Moses' farewell address to the Israelite people gathered at the border of the promised

land. It reinterprets Mosaic instruction (the Jewish Torah or Law) to deal with the situations of later history. This reading comes from Moses' third address (chaps. 29–30) and challenges the people to decide between two ways of living. The format reflects ancient treaties that concluded with a call to the gods to act as witnesses to the treaty. Here the whole created universe is called to witness the covenant (31:28). The people are urged to "choose life," not merely a prolongation of days but the fullness received in love, obedience and faithfulness to God.

Psalm 119:1-8 This psalm is an acrostic psalm, in which the first line of each of its 22 eight-line stanzas begins with a successive letter of the Hebrew alphabet. It is the longest in the Bible. In this reading, the psalmist describes those who are blessed because of their fidelity to God's commands and asks God to give wisdom and discernment for keeping them.

1 Corinthians 3:1-9 In addition to adopting party designations (1:12), the Corinthians seem to have enjoyed categorizing one another's spiritual maturity. Paul informs the Corinthians that they are far from being as spiritually mature (2:6) as they think. Although they have received the Spirit in baptism and are thus implicitly "spiritual," their strife shows that they are not living out their true status. Instead they are living in the

"flesh," like mere human beings. Flesh, for Paul, is not the opposite of spirit; rather, flesh is what is human, weak, mortal, liable to sin. Far from acting as if their lives were determined by the Spirit, the Corinthians' parties and labels show that they are determined by individual or human considerations.

Matthew 5:21-37 Today's and next Sunday's gospels come from the section called "the six antitheses" (5:21-48), so named from the repeated phrase "it was said...but I say." Fundamentally, the antitheses are a statement about who Jesus is and what authority he bears (7:28-29). They also illustrate how Jesus fulfills the law (5:17). He does not pit his teaching against the law, but against the rabbinic interpretations and traditions. Jesus reveals the spirit of the law in a new standard of righteousness. These antitheses reach back past the Mosaic law to the original or "creation will" of God. This means that in some cases (murder, adultery, love of enemy) the law has been strengthened; Jesus' command is "not only...but also." Attention is shifted from external action to internal intention. In other cases (divorce, oaths, retaliation), the law as practiced is abrogated and external performance is altered.


