First Lesson: Deuteronomy 34:1-12

Moses went up from the plains of Moab to Mount Nebo, to the top of Pisgah, which is opposite Jericho, and the Lord showed him the whole land: Gilead as far as Dan, all Naphtali, the land of Ephraim and Manasseh, all the land of Judah as far as the Western Sea, the Negeb, and the Plain—that is, the valley of Jericho, the

city of palm trees—as far as Zoar. The Lord said to him, "This is the land of which I swore to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob, saying, 'I will give it to your descendants'; I have let you see it with your eyes, but you shall not cross over there." Then Moses, the servant of the Lord, died there in the land of Moab, at the Lord's

command. He was buried in a valley in the land of Moab, opposite Beth-peor, but no one knows his burial place to this day. Moses was one hundred twenty years old when he died; his sight was unimpaired and his vigor had not abated. The Israelites wept for Moses in the plains of Moab thirty days; then the period of mourning for Moses was ended.

Joshua son of Nun was full of the spirit of wisdom, because Moses had laid his hands on him; and the Israelites

obeyed him, doing as the Lord had commanded Moses.

Never since has there arisen a prophet in Israel like Moses, whom the Lord knew face to face. He was unequalled for all the signs and wonders that the Lord sent him to perform in the land of Egypt, against Pharaoh and all his servants and his entire land, and for all the mighty deeds and all the terrifying displays of power that Moses performed in the sight of all Israel.

About the Readings

Deuteronomy 34:1-12 Today's reading describes several transitions. The reading itself is the ending of the book of Deuteronomy, which describes the people's pause at the Jordan to rededicate themselves to their covenant obligations before entering the promised land. A second transition is the death of Moses. Though God had forbidden the original exodus generation from entering the new land, God does allow Moses a peek at the land before he dies. The final words sum up the special character of Moses and his unique relationship with God. The final transition is that of the leadership of the community. With Moses' death, the leadership passes to Joshua who will take

the people across the Jordan and oversee their settlement in the land.

Psalms 90:1-6, 13-17 This psalm faces squarely the dark realities of the human condition within the context of faith. Verses 1-2 serve as a preface, introducing the psalmist's unshakable conviction of God's sovereignty. The psalmist confesses the painfulness of life's brevity (vv. 3-6) and the dreadfulness of enduring this fleeting life in the heat of God's righteous anger at our iniquities (vv. 7-11). These reflections culminate in the closing prayer (vv. 12-17), in which the psalmist pleads for God's merciful compassion. In this psalm, attributed to Moses, the shortness

of human life is lamented, and God's presence is sought so that the people may rejoice in all their days.

1 Thessalonians 2:1-8 Paul reminds the Thessalonians of the circumstances of his mission among them. He distinguishes himself from the common itinerant religious and philosophical teachers. Paul does not promote heresy or immorality, use trickery or flattery, nor seek self-aggrandizement. He could have presumed on his apostolic authority, but instead, like a nursing mother, he supported their new life by sharing his very self.

Matthew 22:34-46 Today's reading contains the third of the controversy stories that show Jesus' ability to confute his opponents. The law of Moses as set forth in the first five books of the Bible had, over the passage of centuries, been codified into 613 commandments. The question

was often raised whether they were all of equal weight. The first part of Jesus' answer quotes Deuteronomy 6:5, which began the Jewish morning prayer called the Shema (from the first word in the quote, "hear"). The inclusion of "mind" (v. 37) may be an alternate translation for Gentiles of "heart," which, in Jewish understanding, was the core of a person, the center of thought and will and emotion. The second part of Jesus' answer quotes Leviticus 19:18b. The conjunction of the two Old Testament texts occurs, but infrequently, in rabbinical writing. It may have been original with Jesus. Each commandment is to be understood in the light of the other. Paul quotes the second as the fulfillment of the law, an assertion echoed by other New Testament writers. Matthew has prepared for its importance by stressing it earlier (5:43-48; 19:16-19).
