Saint Andrew's Sunday School Picnic

The members of Saint Andrew's Sunday School, and many of the parishioners enjoyed an outing at Norumbega Park on Tuesday of this week. A special car left Wellesley Square at eleven o'clock, and the whole number present during the day was about seventy-five. A bountiful luncheon had been provided after which ice-cream and candy were distributed and each child was given ten cents by the rector for spending money.

A most enjoyable day was the general verdict and the hope was expressed that another year would see many more present making this a parish picnic.

One of the largest private confirmations which has ever taken place in the diocese was at St. Andrew's Church, Wellesley, on Sept. 17, 1914 when a class of nine was presented to Bishop Babcock by the rector, E.B. Dean.

As we observe Armistice/Veteran's Day: in the autumn of 1914, Bishop William Lawrence authorized a service of intercession for the Peace in the World. President Taft requested all God-fearing persons to repair to their several places of worship and offer supplication to Almighty God for the restoration of peace.

The Festival for the Sunday School of St. Andrew's Church took place on Christmas Eve. A short service was held in the Church at which the children and congregation joined heartily in the Christmas carols. An address was made by the Rector, emphasizing three great thoughts of the Season. Love, Service and Worship.

All were then invited to the Guild Room where a Christmas Tree was found and hailed with delight by the children. In the absence of Santa Claus, Dr. Anthony gave each member of the Sunday School the present that Santa Claus had sent together with a box of candy and an orange.

The Church presents a festive appearance in its garb of green and red; too much credit cannot be given to those who by their faithful and artistic efforts transformed it into a bower of Christmas garlands and beauty.

As the Fourth of July, 1915 comes on Sunday this year, the religious significance of the day will be recalled in the services. Patriotic Hymns will be sung and the Stars and Stripes carried in the procession. Every American ought to share in the Church's celebration of Independence Day.

We possess many national blessings, which we owe to brave men who died that their children might inherit a land of freedom, and to God, the Giver of all good.

Everyone ought to take part in the remembrance of our forefathers and in our thanksgiving to Almighty God.

The rector announced at the morning service last Sunday, that the property in the rear of the church, belonging to the estate of the late Elizabeth Green, has been purchased by St. Andrew's Parish. It is proposed to use that part of the land thus acquired, adjoining and with that owned by the parish, for the erection of a permanent masonry chancel; which will be joined to the present church building, until such time as a new nave can be built. A parish house is also to be constructed between the church and rectory.

brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. About the Readings

Isaiah 6:1-8, (9-13) Isaiah experienced his call to be a prophet in the temple at Jerusalem. He saw a vision of the Lord enthroned amidst the divine council in the setting of the temple at Jerusalem. The triple repetition of holy emphasizes the awesome, unapproachable quality of the divine. Isaiah responds to the experience of God's holiness with a sense of profound sinfulness, not only his own but that of all the people. He is granted cleansing and healing grace through the coal from the altar, so that he may proclaim God's word to the people.

Psalm 138 In this psalm of thanksgiving, the "gods" of verse 1 may be the members of the heavenly council or the rulers and gods of other nations. Verses 1-4 give praise for the Lord's help, and verses 5-7 describe the effect of God's majesty and mercy upon the kings of the earth. The psalm concludes with an expression of the psalmist's trust that God will personally care for him.

1 Corinthians 15:1-11 In preparation for discussing the resurrection of the dead (15:12), Paul reminds the Corinthians of their common ground of belief. By quoting a traditional formulation of the essential proclamation about Christ (15:3-

5), he recalls the basic creedal statements he taught them. Which particular "scriptures" (that is, of the Old Testament) Paul means in verses 3 and 4 is not explicit. In general the statement "in accordance with the scriptures" expresses the conviction that these events took place according to God's purpose. It was, however, the religious experience of the early Christians, not merely the evidence of the Old Testament, that shaped their belief. Paul's list of resurrection appearances can only tentatively be tallied with those in the gospel accounts. Finally, Paul lists the Lord's appearance to him, "as to one untimely born" (v. 8), perhaps referring to Paul's belated revelation, or perhaps taking up a term of abuse applied to him by others. But whatever Paul's defects or his gifts, he preaches the same gospel as the other apostles, the same gospel that the Corinthians accepted.

Luke 5:1-11 Today's story of the wondrous catch of fish focuses on Peter's response and illustrates what every Christian disciple must undergo to follow Jesus. Aware of God's power at work in Jesus, Peter leaves everything to follow him (v. 11). The enormous catch prefigures his missionary success. Jesus reveals the conditions for following him.

First, "Do not be afraid" (v. 10). In the gospels, fear is the opposite of the basic trust that we identify as faith. Faith is the trust in another person that serves as the bond (Latin, fides) of a relationship. Because of that bond, we are willing to

change our lives. Second, Jesus indicates how Peter's life will change. Instead of luring fish into a net, Peter's new job will be "fishing" for people to bring them into the net of Jesus' kingdom community.
