The Sunday school of St. Andrew's Parish, Wellesley, shows a very substantial increase. Last year there were 37 on the roll; at the present time there are 68. The Lenten offering last year was \$17.25; up to date this year it is \$50. At the morning service on Easter Day there were some 150 persons present. When the heavy snow storm is taken into consideration, and that both Wellesley College and Dana Hall were closed, this is an indication of the possibility for permanent growth in this extensive parish.

Ladies of St. Andrew's Listen to Tales from the Front

Mr. George P. Harrington of the American Field Service was the speaker, on Wednesday afternoon, before the ladies of St. Andrews' Church and their friends, at the home of his aunt, Mrs. Arthur P. Dana. Mr. Harrington returned recently from France,

and in a simple, direct way gave a most graphic account of his experiences and observations in his branch of the service. He described the use of the gas mask and helmet, showing from his own equipment how they are used in action. Everyone was intensely interested in this first-hand information of life at the front "over there."

Afternoon tea was served and a silver collection taken for the benefit of the building fund of St. Andrew's Parish.

A branch of the St. Andrew's parish church school will be started in Wellesley Hills on Sunday, October 5. An assembly room conveniently located has been secured, and members of the parish in this rapidly growing suburb are confident that the movement will do much to strengthen the Church in Wellesley.

The heart is devious above all else; it is perverse—who can understand it? I the Lord test the mind and search the heart, to give to all according to their ways, according to the fruit of their doings.

Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say there is no resurrection of the dead? If there is no resurrection of the dead, then Christ has not been raised; and if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain and your faith has been in vain. We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified of God that he raised Christ--whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead

are not raised. For if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised. If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have died in Christ have perished. If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died.

Gospel: Luke 6:17-26

# **About the Readings**

Jeremiah 17:5-10 These verses echo the Jewish tradition of wisdom teaching (such as the book of Proverbs), which guided people in leading a rewarding life. The verses are very similar to Psalm 1 and may have influenced its composition. They contrast the two basic responses—trust in God or trust in human power—and the consequent rewards or punishments that will follow. The term blessed includes both material and spiritual rewards in this world.

Psalm 1 This psalm, with its call to a righteous life based on knowledge of the "law of the Lord," the Torah, serves as a fitting introduction to all the Psalms. It springs from the Wisdom tradition, which emphasized how to live in both material and spiritual prosperity. The righteous are those who have not taken the advice of the wicked, nor imitated their way of life, nor joined in their rejection of the law. They "meditate" upon it, literally, 'read it aloud in a low voice'. The Lord is in intimate and personal relationship with the righteous.

**1 Corinthians 15:12-20** Apparently the Corinthians did not make a direct connection between the resurrection of Christ, in which they did believe, and the resurrection of ordinary human beings. It is not stated explicitly what they did believe about the latter—possibly the Greek notion of the immortality of the soul, or possibly that only those alive at the time of the second coming would be transformed. Paul claims that to deny the resurrection of the dead is to deny the saving effect of Christ's own resurrection, through which Christians are a "new creation" (2 Corinthians 5:17), freed from death and sin. To deny the effect of Christ's resurrection is thus to deny their own experience of forgiveness, of hope for the dead and of ongoing life in Christ (vv. 17-19).

Luke 6:17-26 Today's gospel reading is the first part of Luke's Sermon on the Plain (Luke 6:20-49). It parallels much of the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew. Both begin with beatitudes and end with the parable of the builders, and both have the same general sequence and content. Jesus declares the promises of the kingdom of God to which God's people are called. These promises are directed primarily at the disciples (6:20), for they express a morality grounded, not in humanity, but in God and intelligible only to those already committed to Jesus. The promises are prophetic and eschatological, that is, they refer to the end-time, but they invite participation now. It is those who are in need who have the capacity to receive the wealth, the satisfaction, the consolation and the comradeship of the kingdom. Those whose material and social needs are fulfilled now are likely never to realize their need for God.
