Next Sunday the Holy Communion will be celebrated according to the new proposed liturgy. We will celebrate it every other month on the first Sunday. Comments and suggestions are welcome. 1967

Some structural changes are obvious in the new liturgy, the confession is optional rather than required, and the Prayer for the Whole State of Christ's Church has been transformed into a litany of intercession. The language is different from the traditional usage of the Prayer Book. This proposed revision will be tried throughout the Church for at least the next three years. At the end of this period the General Convention will decide whether or not to initiate change, taking another three years before final revision. 1967

Looking for a replacement of the choir room rugs, used for sound deadening, which were inadvertently sold at the Rummage Sale. Two small rugs (6 x 12) or one large one (15 x 25) would be greatly appreciated. 1967

"Flower Girls" are needed in the Harvey Room, every Sunday after the 11:10am service to package bouquets from the altars. This requires a few minutes time, while waiting for your church school child—a "flower break" instead of a "coffee"! No arranging or delivery necessary. 1967

NEEDED: For tiny Miss Yuko Hayashi—a piano stool that can be adjusted up or down (mostly up).

The organ console is being shipped to the factory in Canada for recommended readjustments by Casavant Frères at their expense. During the interim, we are grateful to Mr. Daniel Pinkham for the loan of his personal organ.

Missing! The F sharp pipe from the borrowed organ has disappeared. It is about seven inches long, silver color and likely was pulled out by a child. Can anyone help locate it?

St. Andrew's Response to the Church World Service Clothing appeal in October was most generous. 284 pounds of good used clothes and six blankets were donated—the largest amount ever received. Many thanks to all who contributed! 1969

This is the time of year when many people say aloud or in our hearts: "I would give more to my church if only I could." If you're one of these, have you considered this question, "How much of my time am I giving to help at St. Andrew's? Could I give more of that, even at the sacrifice of some leisure or

other activity?" 1967

For the past three years intense effort has been made to have more of our work done by volunteers instead of paying somebody to do it. The result has been remarkably good. More of our people have done secretarial work and typing, preparing mailings, counting and recording pledges, bookkeeping, even building repairs and maintenance. These valuable contributions have freed thousands of dollars for outside giving and for debt reduction. St. Andrew's needs your hands as well as your heart.

In 1969, as the vestry was considering purchasing Miss Denton's estate adjoining the church property, Mr. Clark urged the parish "to reflect carefully and prayerfully on the

question of our priority in using large sums for expansion of property in relationship to the urgent needs of people suffering from poverty and racial injustice."

The Peace: After the verbal exchange, we invite you to greet those around you in the pews with a smile, a friendly word, a handshake, or an embrace.

Holy, Holy, Holy... Note that there is no Amen at the conclusion of the Sanctus. Congregation should kneel immediately following the singing.

The Blessing and Dismissal: The Priest may give the traditional blessing prior to the final dismissal. A Deacon, if present, may make the dismissal, to which the congregation responds, "Thanks be to God." Questions, comments, and criticisms of this and all services are always welcome. 1970

First Lesson: 2 Kings 2:1-2, 6-14

When the LORD was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the LORD has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel.

Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the LORD has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. Second Lesson: Galatians 5:1,13-25

For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery. For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another. Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you

want. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.

By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.
