Second Lesson: Romans 4:1-5, 13-17

What then are we to say was gained by Abraham, our ancestor according to the flesh? For if Abraham was justified by works, he has something to boast about, but not before God. For what does the scripture say? "Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to him as righteousness." Now to one who works, wages are not reckoned as a gift but as something due. But to one who without works trusts him who justifies the ungodly, such faith is reckoned as righteousness.

For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations")—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist.

About the Readings

Genesis 12:1-4a At this point in the book of Genesis, the focus changes from the story of all humanity to the story of one man, Abram, and through him to the story of a chosen people. The Lord takes the initiative and calls Abram (Abraham) out of his family structure and the social and cultural security of his present location in Haran to go to the unknown land God will show him. His response is the first of the trustful acts that define him as preeminently the Old Testament man of faith. Abraham and his descendants are chosen to inherit a land, become a great nation and mediate blessing to all the world. The story of Abraham shows how God acts in history through the responses of individuals and peoples. Abraham's decision to yield to the will of God no matter the sacrifice demonstrates the nature of the friendship he had with God.

Psalm 121 This psalm is in dialogue form, possibly between a group of worshippers and a priest, perhaps as a blessing at their arrival at or departure from the temple. The Lord, the Creator, will watch over the people day and night.

Romans 4:1-5, 13-17 Paul cites the example of Abraham to show that the concept of justification by faith is not contrary to the Old Testament, but rather

supported by it. In first-century Judaism, Abraham was held up as the ideal model of righteousness through works. Paul argues that Abraham's faith, his readiness to believe and act upon God's promise, was "reckoned to him as righteousness." It put him in a right relationship to God apart from works. Not only was Abraham justified apart from works, but God even "justifies the ungodly," as Paul shows by quoting Psalm 32:1-2. Righteousness is open to all who trust in God, Jew or Gentile. The promised inheritance comes through faith to Abraham's true descendants, those who follow his example of faith.

John 3:1-17 Today's reading is taken from the first of John's lengthy expositions of Jesus' teachings. Two characteristic techniques are employed: the use of a question asked on the physical level and answered on the spiritual level, and the use of the questioner's misunderstanding. Nicodemus, a member of the Sanhedrin, comes to Jesus because of his interest in Jesus' works. Jesus seeks to draw him past these outward manifestations to a recognition of their inward significance. The meaning of being "born from above" begins their discussion. Nicodemus's misunderstanding centers around the word translated "from above," which, in

Greek, has two meanings. The first is 'anew, again' on the physical level, which is what Nicodemus understands; the second is 'from above' spatially, which is what Jesus seems to intend. Jesus contrasts the realm of the Spirit, which is eternal and heavenly, with the realm of the flesh, which is earthly, weak and mortal (but not necessarily sinful). Both flesh and spirit make up human life, but the Spirit is life itself. The Greek and Hebrew words for wind also mean 'spirit'.

Icon of the Week Desmond Tutu

Desmond Tutu was a South African Anglican cleric. He studied theology at the University of South Africa and King's College London. He became an Anglican priest in 1961 and Bishop of Lesotho in 1976. In 1978 he became general secretary of the South African Council of Churches and an eloquent and outspoken advocate for the rights of Black South Africans.

Tutu emphasized nonviolent protest and encouraged other countries to apply economic pressure on South Africa. Despite bloody violations committed against the Black population, as in the Sharpeville massacre of 1961 and the Soweto uprising in 1976, Tutu adhered to his nonviolent principles. He was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1984 "for his role as a unifying leader in the non-violent campaign to resolve the problem of apartheid in South Africa."

In 1986 he was elected the first Black Archbishop of Cape Town and titular head of South Africa's 1.6-million-member Anglican church. He was named chancellor of the University of the Western Cape in Bellville, South Africa in 1988. He retired from the primacy in 1996 and became chairman of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, charged with hearing evidence of human rights violations under White rule. In 2010 he retired from public life. "When the missionaries came to Africa, they had the Bible and we had the land. They said, 'let us pray.' We closed our eyes. When we opened them, we had the Bible, and they had the land."

His feast day is December 26.

"Disturb us, O Lord, when we are too well-pleased with ourselves, when our dreams have come true because we dreamed too little, because we sailed too close to the shore. Disturb us, O Lord, when with the abundance of things we possess, we have lost our thirst for the water of life when, having fallen in love with time, we have ceased to dream of eternity and in our efforts to build a new earth, we have allowed our vision of Heaven to grow dim. Stir us, O Lord to dare more boldly, to venture into wider seas where storms show Thy mastery, where losing sight of land, we shall find the stars. In the name of Him who pushed back the horizons of our hopes and invited the brave to follow."
