# **About the Readings**

**Genesis 1:1–2:4a** Today's reading is the first of the two creation accounts. In solemn liturgical cadences, the writer shows how darkness and chaos give way to light and order as the waters part at God's command. In contrast to the strongly dualistic interpretation of this world view in other traditions, where chaos always threatens to overwhelm the world again, here God's sovereignty over creation is affirmed. God says, "Let us make humankind" (v. 26). The "us" was taken by early Christian writers to be an allusion to the Trinity. The writer, however, may be referring to a heavenly court. "Humankind," a collective singular noun without indication of number or gender, is created in God's image and likeness, to enter into relationship with God and to be God's representative on earth, especially to share in God's dominion.

2 Corinthians 13:11-13 Paul concludes his second letter to the church in Corinth with an exhortation to be reconciled to one another. The exchange of the "holy kiss" (v. 12), the customary Eastern embrace, became a regular feature of the early liturgy, signaling the reconciliation of the community members. The closing triadic formula expresses a three-fold understanding of Christian experience:

grace received through Jesus leads one to the Father's love, which is expressed through the Spirit.

**Matthew 28:16-20** This Great Commission gathers up the themes that Matthew has woven throughout his work. Jesus' ministry begins and ends on a mountain in Galilee, the place of revelation. There he inaugurates the mission of the Church. Jesus makes a declaration, delivers a command and gives a promise. He has now received the authority of the exalted Son of Man and gives it to his disciples. He commands them to make disciples of "all nations," removing the geographical and ethnic restriction of Jesus' own ministry and of the disciples' previous mission. The earliest accounts of baptism mention only baptism in Jesus' name, but the living experience of the baptized assembly led to the trinitarian formula as expressing the full reality of the new life. To the disciples, Jesus now extends the full range of his ministry to them. Before they had been commissioned only to preach and heal, now they are to teach all that Jesus commanded them. Finally Jesus promises to the disciples his ongoing presence. The pledge of his name, Emmanuel, "God-with-us," is now fulfilled for his gathered people.



# Icon of the Week

# **Holy Trinity**

From a story in the book of Genesis called the hospitality of Abraham, Abraham meets three men later discovered to be angels. This icon depicts the unity of the Godhead—God in three persons—the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Based on Russian iconographer Andrei Rublev's famous icon of the Holy Trinity painted in 1411, which was the first time the Godhead was depicted as three persons.

These angels create a circle inviting us into the center. The angels are depicted talking. The gestures are smooth and restrained, demonstrating the sublime nature of their conversation. The left angel symbolizes God the Father. His right hand is in the gesture for the exordium (saying something important). The central angel represents Christ. The red and gold stole draped over this figure 's right shoulder is modeled after that worn by the sons of the Byzantine emperors indicating royalty; here it indicates Christ's divine Sonship. The right angle represents the Holy Spirit. The blue color of the Holy Spirit's robe symbolizes divinity, the green color represents new life.

The wings of two angels, the Father and the Son overlap. The blue color of the Son's robe symbolizes divinity, the brown color represents earth—his humanity—and the gold speaks of kingship of God. The wings of the Holy Spirit do not touch the Son's wings, they are imperceptibly divided by the Son's spear. The poses and the inclinations of the Holy Spirit and the Son's heads demonstrate their submission to the Father, yet their placement on the thrones at the same level symbolizes equality. The tree symbolizes the Tree of Life and serves as a reminder of Jesus's death on the cross and his subsequent resurrection, which opened the way to eternal life. Finally, the mountain is a symbol of the spiritual ascent, which mankind accomplishes with the help of the Holy Spirit.

The unity of the trinity's underlying reality expresses unity and love between all things: That they may all be one just as you, father, or in me, and I in you, that they also may be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me. —John 17: 21

### Outreach Grants Awarded

• Esperanza Academy is a tuition-free, all-girls, Episcopal middle school located in Lawrence, MA. This grant will support the expansion of the music therapy program, a unique alternative to conventional therapy using writing and singing songs, playing musical instruments, improvising on songs and musical pieces, listening to music, and exchanging information through music. Musical therapy has been proven to be an effective tool in healing negative stress and trauma and boosting emotional intelligence. Grant awarded: \$5000, sponsored by parishioner Randy Parker.

St. Francis House with Boston Healthcare for the Homeless to provide safe, supportive footwear, particularly needed by the unhoused of Boston who walk tens of miles each day. This grant funds the purchase of sneakers and will be ready to launch within weeks of funding being secured. Katherine Jackson, sponsor of this initiative, will create a PowerPoint presentation summarizing the efforts of the program and the outcomes reached. Meanwhile, Katherine will network and continue to reach out to shoe vendors to create a sustainable and ongoing program. Grant awarded: \$5000, sponsored by Katherine Jackson, who has just graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Boston College.
