First Lesson: Genesis 21:8-21

The child grew, and was weaned; and Abraham made a great feast on the day

that Isaac was weaned. But Sarah saw the son of Hagar the Egyptian, whom she had borne to Abraham, playing with her son Isaac. So she said to Abraham, "Cast out this slave woman with her son; for the son of this slave woman shall not inherit along with my son Isaac." The matter was very distressing to Abraham on account of his son. But God said to Abraham, "Do not be distressed because of the boy and because of your slave woman; whatever Sarah says to you, do as she tells you, for it is through Isaac that offspring shall be named for you. As for the son of the slave woman, I will make a nation of him also, because he is your offspring." So Abraham rose early in the morning, and took bread and a skin of water, and gave it to Hagar, putting it on her shoulder, along with the child, and sent her away. And she departed, and wandered about in the wilderness of Beersheba. When the water in the skin was gone, she cast the child under one of the

bushes. Then she went and sat down opposite him a good way off, about the distance of a bowshot; for she said, "Do not let me look on the death of the child." And as she sat opposite him, she lifted up her voice and wept. And God heard the voice of the boy; and the angel of God called to Hagar from heaven, and said to her, "What troubles you, Hagar? Do not be afraid; for God has heard the voice of the boy where he is. Come, lift up the boy and hold him fast with your hand, for I will make a great nation of him." Then God opened her eyes and she saw a well of water. She went, and filled the skin with water, and gave the boy a drink.

God was with the boy, and he grew up; he lived in the wilderness, and became an expert with the bow. He lived in the wilderness of Paran; and his mother got a wife for him from the land of Egypt.

Second Lesson: Romans 6:1b-11

Should we continue in sin in order that grace may abound? By no means! How can we who died to sin go on living in it? Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life.

For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. We

know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. For whoever has died is freed from sin. But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Gospel: Matthew 10: 24-39

Jesus said to the twelve disciples, "A disciple is not above the teacher, nor a slave above the master; it is enough for the disciple to be like the teacher, and the slave like the master. If they have called the master of the house Beelzebul, how much more will they malign those of his household!

"So have no fear of them; for nothing is covered up that will not be uncovered, and nothing secret that will not become known. About the Readings

Genesis 21:8-21 Hagar, Sarah's Egyptian servant, had borne Ishmael when it seemed impossible for Sarah to conceive. Her fertility was a sore point with Sarah who remained childless. After Sarah gave birth to Isaac, the child of God's promise to Abraham and Sarah, Sarah's jealousy erupted and she considered Ishmael's presence a threat to the inheritance destined for Isaac. She demanded that Abraham get rid of Hagar and the child. Though reluctant to do this, Abraham is reassured by God that they will be all right. So he took them to the wilderness and sent them off. When her provisions ran out, Hagar cried to God in her despair. God answered by sending an angel to ensure their survival. God continued to be with them as the child grew and prospered.

Psalm 86:1-10, 16-17 This personal lament by one of God's devoted servants call upon God's help in a time of distress. Relying on God's goodness and forgiveness (v. 5) and knowing that God is "merciful and gracious" and full of "steadfast love" (v. 15), the psalmist is confident that God will hear and answer his prayer.

Romans 6:1b-11 Paul defends himself against the charge (3:8; 6:1) that his emphasis upon grace as a free gift not dependent upon works was an encouragement to sin (5:20). He replies by pointing out the fact and nature of the Christian's new relationship to God: in baptism the Christian has died to sin. The waters of baptism identify the believer with Christ, indeed with the very act of redemption-his death and resurrection. By Jesus' act, the penalty for sin-deathhas been paid; baptism credits us with that payment. The Christian has put off, like old clothes, the old "body of sin"-not the physical body as opposed to the soul, but the sinful impulses of both body and mind. In rabbinical understanding, death freed one from the claims of the commandments, "death pays all debts." Thus the Christian is no longer enslaved to sin, for Paul asserts that death in baptism frees one from sin. The Christian has been justified, set right, by being united to Christ. Now he or she begins to grow into this reality, although full participation in the resurrection is a future event (6:8). The Christian lives between the already and the not yet, called to "become (in life) what you are (through baptism)."

Matthew 10:24-39 Today's reading is a part of Jesus' instructions to the Twelve (10:1-42), whom he sends out to continue his ministry. Much of the material in the first section is found in Mark and Luke, not in their mission discourses, but in the eschatological discourses near the end of the gospels (Mark 13:9-13; Luke 21:12-19). The same kind of warnings are found also in the farewell discourse in John (chaps. 14–16). Matthew, however, indicates that he sees persecution as part of the normal life of the Church rather than as a special

sign of the end. Matthew exhorts
Christians to fearless confession. Disciples
are encouraged three times (10:26, 28, 31)
not to fear what any person can do. In
contrast to fearing people, the fear of God
is an open, reverent, humble awe. This
trust in God bestows fearlessness upon all
disciples. The death and resurrection of
Jesus show that those who kill the body
cannot separate disciples from God and
from fullness of life. The denial or
acknowledgement of Christ is the
touchstone of each disciple's destiny.



Icon of the Week

St. Paul of the Shipwreck

St. Paul the Apostle had increasing trouble as he tried to integrate the new followers of Christ into the Jewish religion Amongst many things, he was charged with defiling the temple by allowing Gentiles access. An enraged mob tried to kill him, but Roman centurions intervened to save his life. For two years he awaited trial in Caesarea. When a decision was made to have him returned to Jerusalem, Paul exercised his right as a Roman citizen to be heard in Rome. This initiated the trip by ship to Rome in 60 AD and the shipwreck, the subject of this icon.

Malta, a tiny island off the Italian coast, was, after many stormy days at sea, where they finally ran the ship aground. Paul worked many miracles in Malta, and after three months, made his way to Rome where he was eventually beheaded sometime between the years 64 to 68 AD.

Paul, writing in 2 Corinthians 12, states he will not boast about all the wonderful things God has done for him. He describes instead his reason to boast of his weaknesses. He believes God gave him a thorn in the flesh and told him: "My grace is all you need; power is most fully seen in weakness." Therefore, I am content with a life of weakness, insult, hardship, persecution, and distress, all for Christ's sake; for when I am weak, then I am strong.

This icon is offered in the hope that you will find strength in your weakness.

His feast day is June 29.

O God of peace, who has taught us that in returning and rest we shall be saved, in quietness and in confidence shall be our strength: By the might of your Spirit lift us, we pray you, to your presence, where we may be still and know that you are God; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. —BCP, p.832
