First Lesson: Exodus 16:2-15

The whole congregation of the Israelites complained against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness. The Israelites said to them, "If only we had died by the hand of the Lord in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the fleshpots and ate our fill of bread; for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger." Then the Lord said to Moses, "I am going to rain bread from heaven for you, and each day the people shall go out and gather enough for that day. In that way I will test them, whether they will follow my instruction or not. On the sixth day, when they prepare what they bring in, it will be twice as much as they gather on other days." So Moses and Aaron said to all the Israelites, "In the evening you shall know that it was the Lord who brought you out of the land of Egypt, and in the morning you shall see the glory of the Lord, because he has heard your complaining against the Lord. For what are we, that you complain against us?" And Moses said, "When the Lord gives you meat to eat in the evening and your fill of bread in the morning, because the Lord has heard the complaining

that you utter against him—what are we? Your complaining is not against us but against the Lord." Then Moses said to Aaron, "Say to the whole congregation of the Israelites, 'Draw near to the Lord, for he has heard your complaining." And as Aaron spoke to the whole congregation of the Israelites, they looked toward the wilderness, and the glory of the Lord appeared in the cloud. The Lord spoke to Moses and said, "I have heard the complaining of the Israelites; say to them, 'At twilight you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have your fill of bread; then you shall know that I am the Lord your God." In the evening quails came up and covered the camp; and in the morning there was a layer of dew around the camp. When the layer of dew lifted, there on the surface of the wilderness was a fine flaky substance, as fine as frost on the ground. When the Israelites saw it, they said to one another, "What is it?" For they did not know what it was. Moses said to them, "It is the bread that the Lord has given you to eat."

Intercessions from the Diocesan Cycle of Prayer

About the Readings

Exodus 16:2-15 Today's reading recounts one of the many instances of the people's murmuring during the time of the exodus (see also Exodus 32 and Numbers 11 and 14). The Israelites long for the meat and bread they ate in Egypt. The Lord responds by providing for them both flesh and bread, but on God's own terms, one day at a time. Thus God may "test" (v. 4) their faith. God acts, saying: "You shall know that I am the Lord your God" (v. 12). This statement of recognition occurs in the priestly writings, in Isaiah and in Ezekiel. God's actions disclose, to believer and unbeliever, the Lord of our world and life. God provides from nature's bounty for the Israelites, reliably supplying the needs of an unreliable people.

Psalm 105:1-6, 37-45 This hymn praises God who promised the land of Canaan to the covenant people and then kept the promise. The people are invited to praise God and seek God's presence (vv. 1-6) The whole story of the land "from the original promise to Abraham (vv. 7-11), to the ancestors in Canaan (vv. 12-15), Joseph in Egypt (vv. 16-22), Israel in Egypt (vv. 23-38) and Israel in the wilderness (39-45)" reveals how faithful God always was to the original promise. Philippians 1:21-30 The church in Philippi was Paul's first congregation formed on European soil, and his relationship with it remained consistently warm and close. Because of Paul's references to being imprisoned and to the imperial guard (1:13), it was often thought that this letter was written from Rome about AD 62. Some scholars now believe that it was written earlier from Ephesus, where the praetorian guard was also stationed. In today's selection, Paul meditates upon the possibility of imminent execution. For Paul, both life and death are under the rule of Christ. Though life means communion with Christ, death will bring even fuller communion. Life, however, includes the opportunity to serve Christ further.

Matthew 20:1-16 The parable of the laborers in the vineyard is found only in Matthew. The point of the parable lies in the landowner's actions and is thus sometimes called the parable of the generous employer. The question "Are you envious because I am generous?" (v. 15) may be more literally translated "Is your eye evil because I am good?" An "evil eye" indicates a jealous, ungenerous, envious attitude. Matthew has chosen to

set the parable before the Zebedee brothers' question on precedence (20:20-27). Thus it stands as a reminder to disciples in the Church that the first may again become last if they grumble at the reward the Lord gives to others, even to latecomers. The strength of Jesus' message is found in his words about God's generosity. God, as supreme Judge, has the right to say "I grant mercy to whom I will."

Icon of the Week St. Robert (Rupert) of Salzburg 660-718

Robert, a member of a noble Frankish family, lived in the eighth century during the time of Childebert III, King of the Franks. He was appointed bishop of Worms, Germany, and then dedicated himself to spreading the faith among the Germans. With the patronage of Duke Thedo of Bavaria, he took over the deserted town of Luvavum about 697, which became Salzburg, Austria. Robert founded a church, a monastery, and a school; brought in groups of missionaries; and established a nunnery at Nonnberg with his niece, Eerentrudis, serving as the abbess.

He developed salt works to support the mission. Because of the importance of salt (in German, salz) to the saint's work, his attribute is a salt bucket. The bucket may have different shapes in different images. One also sees a pallium, a long band of cloth, adorned with crosses, that hangs from the neck of an archbishop and symbolizes authority. Robert was not himself an archbishop, but he founded what became the archdiocese of Salzburg. The monastery, the church, and the works became the nucleus for the city of Salzburg. He died at Salzburg and is venerated as the first archbishop of this major diocese in the West. Robert is revered as the Apostle of Bavaria and Austria.


His feast day is September 24.
