Icon of the Week

St. Jerome

341-420

At age 18, St. Jerome went to Rome where in six years he mastered Greek and Roman literature. He took Cicero as a model for his rhetoric. He was baptized at Rome but claims that worldly distractions diluted his Christianity. For several years after 366 he lived as a monk near his hometown on the Adriatic. When Jerome traveled to Antioch in 374, he fell ill with a high fever. In a delirium he dreamed he was before Christ's judgement seat: "Who are you?" a voice asked. "I'm a Christian," Jerome said. "No, you're a liar. You're Cicero's disciple, not mine." Jerome responded by withdrawing into the Syrian desert for five years of prayer and fasting. Afterwards, Jerome undertook biblical studies with St. Gregory at Constantinople. He launched his life project of producing an accurate Latin Bible. Over several decades he translated afresh most of the Old Testament and corrected the text of the New Testament. For 15 centuries, his edition of Scripture, called the Vulgate, was the benchmark translation of the Bible in the western church.

Jerome's sharp tongue and curmudgeonly disposition made him many enemies. He was seldom pleasant, but he was never dull. His nastiness marred his reputation. Sexual temptations plagued him, but he distracted himself by studying Hebrew. He was forced to relocate to Bethlehem in 385. Yet, St. Paula and other high-born women joined him. The two saints founded a monastery for men, a convent for women, and a hospice for visitors to the Holy Land. St. Jerome died there in 420.

His feast day is September 30.

After 404, barbarians overran Rome, and many Christians fled to the Holy Land. At Bethlehem, Jerome dropped all his biblical studies. "Today," he said, "we must translate the words of Scripture into deeds, and instead of speaking saintly words, we must act them."
