First Lesson: 1 Samuel 3:1-10

Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the Lord under Eli. The word of the Lord was rare in those days; visions were not widespread.

At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was. Second Lesson: 2 Corinthians 4:5-12

We do not proclaim ourselves; we proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your slaves for Jesus' sake. For it is the God who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

But we have this treasure in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us. We are afflicted in every

way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be made visible in our bodies. For while we live, we are always being given up to death for Jesus' sake, so that the life of Jesus may be made visible in our mortal flesh. So death is at work in us, but life in you.

Gospel: Mark 2:23-3:6

One sabbath Jesus and his disciples were going through the grainfields; and as they made their way his disciples began to pluck heads of grain. He entered the house of God, when Abiathar was high priest, and ate the bread of the Presence, which it is not lawful for any but the priests to eat, and he gave some to his companions." Icon of the Week

Edith Stein

October 12, 1891-August 9, 1942

From childhood, Edith Stein was a brilliant scholar. She earned her doctorate at age 25, studying under philosopher Edmund Husserl. Although she was an avowed atheist as a teenager, she became captivated by the writings of St. Teresa of Avila when she reached adulthood. Seeking to follow St. Teresa's example, she became a Catholic. At that point, she wanted to be a nun but was dissuaded by her spiritual mentor. She then taught at a Catholic school of education in Speyer, Germany.

Edith translated several important philosophical works and wrote commentaries on them which led to her giving lectures to large audiences. With Hitler's rise to power, and the requirement of an "Aryan certificate" for civil servants in April 1933, she had to quit her teaching position and her public influence came to an end because of her Jewish heritage. Her spiritual advisers finally allowed her to enter the Carmel at Cologne. As a Carmelite, she assumed the name Teresa Benedicta of the Cross.

In 1938, she was transferred, along with her biological sister Rosa, by then also a convert and an extern, to another Carmelite community in Holland to escape persecution. But in 1942, all baptized Catholics of Jewish origin (244 of them) in Holland were arrested by the Gestapo on August 2, 1942. She and her sister were sent to the Auschwitz concentration camp and were murdered in the Birkenau gas chambers on August 9,1942.

Her feast day is August 9.
