* Tips from the Ushers

- All are welcome at the altar rail for communion or a blessing.
- Ushers will release each row, starting from the back and ending with the transept.
 - Right side From the center aisle, an usher will guide you to the rail from the pulpit to the bend in the rail.
 - Left side From the center aisle, an usher will guide you from the bend in the rail along the left side of the altar.
 - Transept Please wait for usher instructions after the main church has gone forward.
- To receive communion, cup your hands for a wafer. You may drink from the chalice or dip your wafer.
- For a blessing, cross your arms over your chest.
- Afterward, please return to your pew via the side aisles for quiet prayer.

Icon of the Week

St. Teresa of Avila

March 28, 1515-October 4, 1582

St. Teresa of Ávila, born Teresa de Cepeda y Ahumada, was a Spanish Carmelite nun, mystic, and saint. After entering a convent around the age of 20, she fell seriously ill. She underwent a religious awakening in 1555 and, despite her frail health, initiated the Carmelite Reform, leading the order's return to its original austere practices, including poverty and seclusion from the world. Against some opposition, she opened new convents (the first in 1562) under the reformed order throughout Spain. St. John of the Cross joined her in her efforts, establishing reformed Carmelite monasteries. Her doctrines have been accepted as the classical exposition of the contemplative life, and her spiritual writings are still widely read today, among them The Interior Castle and The Way of Perfection. In 1970 she became the first woman elevated to the position of Doctor of the Church.

Among her beliefs she said, "Mental prayer in my opinion is nothing else than an intimate sharing between friends; it means taking time frequently to be alone with Him who we know loves us. The important thing is not to think much but to love much and so do that which best stirs you to love. Love is not great delight but desire to please God in everything." Her last words were, "O my Lord! Now is the time we may see each other."

Her feast day is October 15.

O God, by your Holy Spirit you moved Teresa of Avila to manifest to your Church the way of perfection: Grant us, we pray, to be nourished by her excellent teaching, and enkindle within us a keen and unquenchable longing for true holiness; through Jesus Christ, the joy of loving hearts, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.
