## Icon of the Week

## C.S. Lewis

November 29, 1898-November 22, 1963

Clive Staples Lewis was a writer and a scholar. He taught at Oxford University and became a renowned Christian apologist writer, using logic and philosophy to support the tenets of his faith. He is also known throughout the world as the author of *The Chronicles of Narnia*.

Lewis' mother died when he was age ten, and he went on to receive his precollege education from a tutor and at boarding schools. During WWI, he served with the British army and was sent home after being wounded. Lewis graduated from Oxford University with a focus on literature and classic philosophy. In 1925 he was awarded a fellowship teaching position at Magdalen College, which was part of the university. There, he joined the group known as "The Inklings," an informal collective of writers and intellectuals who counted among their members, Lewis' brother Warren, and J.R.R. Tolkien. It was through conversations with group members that Lewis found himself re-embracing Christianity after having become disillusioned with faith as a youth. He would go on to become renowned for his rich apologist texts, in which he explained his spiritual beliefs using logic and philosophy. Lewis, who was a prolific author of fiction and nonfiction, wrote dozens of books over the course of his career. During WWII, Lewis gave highly popular radio broadcasts on Christianity which won many converts; his speeches were collected in the work *Mere Christianity*. The following is a quote from the end of The Last Battle and it is the final paragraph in The Chronicles of Narnia series.

"And for us this is the end of all the stories, and we can most truly say that they all lived happily ever after. But for them it was only the beginning of the real story. All their life in this world and all their adventures in Narnia had only been the cover and the title page: now at last they were beginning Chapter One of the Great Story which no one on earth has read: which goes on forever: in which every chapter is better than the one before."

## College/Gap Year Care Packages

Sending college (and post-secondary school) packages is a tradition at St. Andrew's. Each year we send packages to 12 Wily Scholars and to parishioners who have graduated from high school. Wily Scholars are college students who have largely grown up in the foster care system and are now in college. The Wily Network helps support these students so they have all that they need to get through four years of college.
